



## BOSTON BOYS' CLUB WINS IN SWIMMING

### VERY STRONG OPPONENT

Last Saturday the Blue swimmers opened the season by a meet with the Boston Boys' Club, and, in spite of the fact that a new backstroke record was made, suffered defeat by a score of 44 to 18. The invaders were nearly all veterans, and many of them have swum against Andover for the last two years. Unfortunately Captain Westfall was not up to his old form, as he lost ground in the fifty and the hundred. The relay was swum in better time by both teams than ever before, breaking the old record. In the dives it was our misfortune that both Kimball and Brainard were out because of sickness. Skinney, of the Boys' Club, did not race against Westfall this year because of his entry in other events. In Mooney Andover finds a very promising dash-man, and it is hoped that he will fulfil our expectations. Altogether the team this year is good, although a little weak in the two hundred and the breaststroke, but perhaps this may be remedied when Coach Dake has had more time to develop the men. Since Kimball will probably be diving next week, and the times in the relay and backstroke were better than any of last year, the meet with Dean next week should tell a different story.

After the customary opening cheers, the meet was started by the relay, in which Lynch, Brodney, Lee, and Skinney swam King, Mooney, Jones, and Captain Westfall. In the first fifty yards the visitors gained a slight edge, which the Andover swimmers were unable to make up, and won with a time of 1:45:1-5. Casey and Nolan dove for the Boston team, the former beating McCloy and C. Williamson with a point score of 88, while the two Andover men were second and third respectively. The next event was the fifty-yard free style, won by Lee of the visitors with a time of 26 1-5 seconds. Lynch was second and Westfall and Jones followed him closely. Undoubtedly the feature of the meet was the 100-yard backstroke, in which Anderson won by a large margin, with Hurley second, Meaney third, and Greenway of the Blue last. The winner's time was 1:08:3-5, which establishes a new pool record. In the 100-yard breaststroke Lynch won with a time of 1:20:4-5, Carr of Boston and Tatlock and Phillips of Andover followed in that order. The Boston team was again victorious in the 200-yard swim. Skinney kept up a good pace all through and beat Fry with a time of 2:20:3-5. Schultz of the visitors was third and Young of Andover last. The final event of the meet was the 100-yard dash, in which Lynch of the Boys' Club beat Mooney and Westfall. The time was 60 4-5 seconds.

Andover got the ball on the tip-off and took it down the floor, but failed to score. The blue team then commenced a fast-passing, close-guarded game, and the ball exchanged hands rapidly. In the Greater Boston Interscholastic Hockey League, Melrose is tied with Newton for first place.

Allman, left wing, seems to be one of the outstanding players. He scored all three goals against Exeter and is a man to be watched closely. Harris, center, and W. Spagafore, left defense, are also stars, both of whom have played well in the Interscholastic Hockey League games. The Melrose defense is exceptionally good and it will take a smooth-working Andover team to even get within shooting distance of their cage. ## ANDOVER GRADUATE SPEAKS IN CHAPEL

### WISHES TO RAISE MONEY FOR SCHOOL IN INDIA

The Monday morning chapel service was devoted to a talk by Mr. Miller, a graduate of Phillips Academy, and a great friend of Dr. Stearns. For the last twenty-five years Mr. Miller has been working in the southern part of India about 200 miles from its so-called "jumping off place." He has taken over for his work a territory of approximately the same area and population as Massachusetts. He started a school of about three hundred boys to teach them Christian citizenship and a trade with which they could make a living. The college section of the school soon grew to five hundred pupils and left one thousand in the lower schools. Mr. Miller formed an agricultural course in which he was very much interested. It soon became a standard course in the whole of South India. This course is doing a great deal of good for India as only ten per cent of the population lives in the cities, where they get ten cents a day for manual labor. Because of this fact tourists never see real India, since they usually visit the cities where the great Hindu temples are.

Returning to the boys, Mr. Miller said that their expenses were very low; for \$2 a month will feed them, and they prefer to sleep on grass mats on the floor. These boys are keen for athletics, although they do not like baseball because the ball comes too fast. Their favorite sports are track, football, tennis, and cricket. Mr. Miller is always trying to improve his school. He is now endeavoring to better the athletic equipment. He has bought a large tract of land on which he wishes to construct two football fields, a cricket field, locker rooms, a stadium, and some tennis courts. Because of the low cost of labor this undertaking will only cost two thousand dollars.

Thinking that his boys deserve some of the many advantages which we have here, Mr. Miller has come to Andover to offer us the opportunity of helping him in his great work.

**THE NEW INSURANCE PLAN**

At the faculty meeting last Monday evening, they voted to adopt a new plan of group insurance covering all the faculty members and regular employees who wish to join in the group. The rate of the premiums is so small that, although the maximum insurance is \$5,000, the faculty considers it a very good proposition, and at present 80% of the regular employees have registered their intentions of taking the policy out. The total amount is something over \$300,000 and the premium is to be paid partly by the employees and partly by the trustees. One of the outstanding factors of this policy is the fact that no physical examination is required.

**COMMUNICATION**

**TRACK RESULTS**

The showings made in last Saturday's intra-squad track meet were on the whole very gratifying to Coaches Shepard and Shields. The results and times will give one a good idea of the comparative ability of the leading men in each event.

The times made by the leading relay men were not available for publication, but the ranking of the first six men on the squad according to Saturday's results is as follows: French, Wright, Pitkin, O'Kane, Pew and Henry Pitkin and O'Kane were tied.

One of the upsets of the meet occurred when King placed a shade ahead of Osborn in the finals of the 40-yard dash. King's time was 4 9-10 seconds. Williams was third.

The 40-yard low hurdles were just as close. P. K. Allen barely nosing out C. Williamson. Moore trailed a couple of yards behind. Allen covered the ground in 5 3-5 seconds.

The best times turned in for the 150-yard dash were 17 2-5 seconds by King and Osborn and 18 1-5 by Barres and Handley.

R. Page easily led the 300-yard sprinters with 36 4-5 seconds. Person and Morrow made the two laps in 37 3-5 and 37 4-5 respectively.

In the 600-yard run Henkle was first with 1 min., 23 2-5 seconds. Lawrence and Norris were next with 1:24 2-5 and 1:25 2-5.

Johnson won the 1000-yard run with a time of 2:33 4-5. Dickinson followed in 2:37, while Chickering took third with 2:40.

The results of the high jump may sound surprising. Marsh won with a jump of 5 feet 4 inches. Moore and Reed tied for second at 5 feet 2 inches. Moore's failure to win was due to the fact that Coach Shepard was teaching him to take off further back from the bar.

Churchill led the broad jumpers with a leap of 19 feet 4 1-2 inches. Woodward covered 18 feet 10 inches, and Grandin did 18 feet six inches.

Pierce's vault of 11 feet took first for him in the pole vaulting. Brown's and Williamson's best vaults were 10 feet 9 inches, and 9 feet 6 inches, respectively.

Jackson stepped out in front of Captain Houston to win the shot-put with a throw of 47 feet 7 inches. Houston's was 46 feet 4 1-4 inches. Viviano did 39 feet 8 inches.

Houston easily maintained his supremacy in the discus. His best throw covered 115 feet 5 inches. Viviano was third best with a throw of 95 feet.

Since the score was 15-19 with the opponents in the lead, they began stalling for time. This, how-




