

# PA CAPTURES FOUR A-E CONTESTS

## Blue Racketmen Down Exeter; Andover Wrestlers Top Exeter Counterparts; Finish Season With 13-1 Mark 24-14 Victory Insures Undefeated 8-0 Season

Saturday, March 6; Exeter - Andover's squash team, in a fitting end to an excellent season, routed its counterparts from Exeter, 6-1.

In his final appearance as number one man for Andover, Pete Blasier massacred his opponent, Hatten, in three straight games, 17-14, 15-12, 15-8. Overall, Blasier has had a very successful season, losing only once in prep school competition. He also won the Fagan Cup tourney and placed second in the Interschols.

### duPont Compiles 16-1 Record

In the number three position, captain Frank duPont, also a senior, defeated his opponent, Sarfraz, in four games. This was duPont's sixteenth win of the year against one defeat. duPont also had an excellent showing in

in the Fagan Cup tourney. Kaplan and Chase are the only two underclassmen on the varsity and will be the numbers one and two men returning next year.

Sustaining Andover's only loss of the day was Seth Walworth, the fifth senior on the team, who played in the number two position. Walworth lost a heartbreaker, his opponent, Fisher, hit a between the legs reverse corner shot to win the match 15-14 in the fifth game. Walworth had an excellent year, moving up three places on the ladder while compiling an 11-3 record. His hard work and constant drive to win led him to become the most improved player on the team.

The varsity squash team thus completed an excellent season, compiling a 13-1 record, the best in PA history. Losing only to the Harvard JV's in their second match of the season, the racketmen were undefeated in prep school competition and went on to win the Interschols.

Saturday, March 6; Andover - Winning its eighth straight dual meet of the year, the Andover varsity wrestling team closed out its undefeated season with an impressive 24-14 win over Exeter. Although the Blue could not pick up a pin, it did win three important matches in the 133, 138, and 177 weight classes to provide the margin of victory.

In a rematch of the Interschols meeting, Russ Graham met Sam Perkins in the 133 lb. weight class. In this match, however, Graham completely dominated Perkins starting with a takedown in the opening period. Although he was reversed in the second period, Graham escaped and held a 3-2 lead going into the final session. In that period, Graham escaped again, took the ensuing takedown and picked up a minute riding time to win, 7-2.


Pat O'Connor, wrestling in the 138 weight class, reversed the outcome of his previous match with Exeter co-captain Gary Humphrey, taking his match by

the score of 3-2. O'Connor lost the initial takedown but then came back, escaped, and got the takedown near the end of the first period. There were no points scored in either of the next two periods, however, as O'Connor held on to win.

In yet a third rematch, Tod

picked up three takedowns during his match and completely dominated his opponent to win. Frisbie also overwhelmed his man and came very close to pinning in the final seconds but time ran out and he had to settle for the decision.

Ken Lacey also won easily, as

### Interschols Champs Win

Craig Reynolds, revenging last year's Interschols loss, defeated Ernie Rau, 5-1. Reynolds took the initial takedown but Rau escaped mid-way through the final period to make the score 2-1 with a minute to go. Reynolds got the key takedown with one second left and got a minute riding time to win.

Jeff Rosen and Bob Frisbie both overwhelmed their men, winning 10-1 and 11-0 respectively. Rosen

he picked up a takedown in the first period, a reversal in the second period, and then went on to win, 8-0. Walter Haydock wrestled well for the fourth straight match, this time clinching the meet with his 8-5 victory. The big factor in the win was Haydock's ability to get the takedowns as he took three to win.

Dave Kawano and Liné Chafee both lost close matches. Kawano gave up a key reversal at the end of the first period and lost, 5-3, while Chafee gave up the initial takedown and could not come back, finally losing 2-1. Kevin McCall also lost a tight match as his opponent got a late escape and two minutes riding time to win, 9-6. Tom Hewitt, wrestling in the unlimited weight class, lost to Interschols champion Paul Dowling, getting pinned mid-way through the second period.

## SWIMMERS TOP EXETER, 61-34; 13 RECORDS SET DURING MEET

Saturday, March 6; Andover - Led by the swimming of Tim Neville, Myles Standish, and Alex Kazickas, Andover's swimming team crushed Exeter, 61-34. In the course of the meet, the Blue collected a total of 13 New England, School, Pool, or Andover-Exeter Meet records.

Neville, Standish, Kazickas All the marks set by Andover during the meet were set by Tim Neville, Myles Standish, and Alex Kazickas. Leading the way, Neville ended an outstanding Andover career, with possibly his best performance ever, as he himself reset seven of the 13 new records. Neville's first race of the day came in the 50 freestyle. Taking the start, Neville streaked his way down the pool, in a time of 21.8. He missed the National Prep School record by only two-tenths of a second, but did erase the Andover Pool, School, and the

Andover-Exeter records.

In his next event, the 100 butterfly, Neville easily outdistanced both Jim Kulikowski, and Bob Wrensen of Exeter to win the race. He collected a new Pool, School, Meet, and New England record in the event with a time of 53.3.

Myles Standish, another Andover double winner, set four new records. Swimming in the 200 IM with junior Mark List, Andover swept the event. Standish won with a time of 2:06.0, eclipsing Neville's old school record of 2:06.9. Standish's time also erased the A-E meet record that was formerly held by Gerkin of Exeter.

Returning five events later, Standish and Peter Anderson combined for the biggest upset of the day. Matched against Exeter's highly touted Jim Clarke, both Standish and Anderson advanced (Continued On Page Three)

## PA Hockey Routs Exeter, 9-2; Wheeler, O'Brien, and Bolduc Pace Andover Scoring Attack

Saturday, March 6; Exeter - Sparked by the five goal production of the second line, the PA hockey team easily routed arch-rival Exeter, 9-2. On the second unit, Bob Wheeler and captain Kevin O'Brien each tallied twice, while center Sandy McAdam scored once. Picking up four assists, McAdam was also the game's leading scorer with five points.

In the nets for Andover, goalie John Boynton continued to display his excellent form shown since the Dartmouth game. Letting up just one score to the Red, Boynton played a near perfect game. In one stretch during the third period, he turned back three Exeter shots in a row while playing without the goalie stick. Using his legs and glove as his only means of defense, he still managed to stand firm against the enclave of Red slap shots that were directed at him.

Defensemén Ethan Warren, John Miner, Peter Morin, Buzz Olsen, and Allen Cregg also turned in fine performances. Their ability to prevent Exeter stars Joe Marsh and Bryan Bossy from taking clear shots on goal was the main reason for PEA's ineffective offense.

### Wheeler Opens Scoring

At 1:41 of the opening period, Wheeler and McAdam combined to produce Andover's first score. Taking a faceoff to the left of goalie Murray, McAdam shot a perfect pass to Wheeler, who then lifted the puck into the right corner of the net.

Two minutes later, senior Jeff Garrity tipped in the rebound of a shot by Steve Weiner to give PA a 2-0 lead. The goal was

Garrity's sixth of the year.

In the middle period, the Andover offense exploded to put the contest out of reach, scoring four goals within a space of six minutes. First-liner Danny Bolduc opened the scoring when he tallied off a pass by Craig Brickley. Sandy McAdam quickly increased the lead 4-0 when he lifted a feed from Wheeler over Murray's shoulder. Taking a pinpoint lead pass from Chris Breton, Wheeler tallied on a breakaway at 11:30 to make the score 5-0. Rounding out the scoring in the period was Kevin Burke, who picked up his 27th goal of the season on a 20-foot wrist shot.

### O'Brien Scores Two

In the final period PA still continued to dominate play. At 8:16, Bolduc tallied his second goal of the game to make the score


### Kaplan, Chase Win

## Wrestling Interschols Champ Rosen Finishes Second; Bolduc, Kelley Place Third And Fourth, Respectively

In a tight ballot, Tim Neville was chosen by the PHILLIPPIAN as PA's "Athlete of the Term" this winter. Wrestler Jeff Rosen finished a close second, while upper Danzy Bolduc earned third place in the voting.

A member of the varsity swimming team for four years, Neville set seven individual records during the 1970-71 season. His time of 21.8 in the 50 yard freestyle set new pool, school, and A-E records, as did his time of 53.3 in the 100 yard butterfly. Neville also holds the New England record in the butterfly event.

In addition, he is a co-holder of the school record for the 100 yard freestyle and was a member of both record-setting relay teams. He also had held the record in the 200 IM until Myles Standish broke it against Exeter.

Second place finisher Jeff Rosen ended his Andover career with a 10-1 victory over his counterpart from Exeter. Giving up a total of only three points to all of his opponents, Rosen finished the season with an undefeated 8-0 dual meet record and came on to win the New England Interschols for the second year in a row. Rosen extended his career record at PA to 23-0, giving up just seven points.

Hockey stalwart Dan Bolduc led the team in scoring with a total of 54 points on 33 goals and 21 assists. His goal output left him just one shy of the record 34 scored by Joe Cavanaugh in 1967. A major threat against every team that he faced, Bolduc tallied at least once in 14 consecutive games over the season before he was held scoreless in the St. Paul's contest.

Finishing fourth in the poll, Bob Kelley was the high scorer on the basketball team, averaging over 20 points a game. Kelley set an Andover scoring record when he poured in 49 points against Exeter. This performance almost single-handedly led the Blue to its first win over Exeter in three years.

Co-captain of the wrestling team Bob Frisbie earned fifth place. Along with Rosen, Frisbie was the only person on the team to compile an undefeated dual meet record. Frisbie also successfully defended his Interschols crown as he easily defeated the three opponents that he faced.

Burke Takes Sixth  
The most improved player on the hockey team, sixth place finisher Kevin Burke was just one point behind Bolduc in scoring with 53 points. Over this season, Burke led the team in hat-tricks, with six to his credit.

Squash captain Frank duPont received a seventh place ranking in the poll. Compiling a 16-1 record over the year, which was the best on the team, duPont played a major role in PA's victory in the Interschols as he easily won the class "B" tournament.

Only a lower, Craig Brickley finished in eighth place. A member of the first line in hockey along with Bolduc and Burke, Brickley set a new seasonal assist record. Recording 37 in 18 games, Brickley broke the previous record by six points.

On account of his outstanding swimming performances, lower Myles Standish received a ninth place standing in the poll. A distance man, Standish established new school records in both the 200 yard IM and 400 yard freestyle.

Taking tenth place in the poll track captain Trip Anderson was the team's leading scorer. Andover's number one man in both the hurdles and the high jump, Anderson was a consistent finisher in every event for the Blue.

Peter Blasier finished eleventh in the voting. Number one on the squash team for the entire year, Blasier upset number two seed Bill Fisher of Choate to move into the finals of the Interschols, where he lost to De Niord of Kent.

In 12th place, Alex Kazickas was the third swimmer to be chosen in the top fifteen places. Swimming against Exeter, he set a school and A-E record in the 100 yard backstroke with a time of 55.3 seconds.

Wrestling Interschols champions took the last three places as Walter Haydock placed 13th, Ken Lacey 14th, and Craig Reynolds 15th.



## Exeter Tips PA Track, 55-40; PA Cops Five Firsts In Loss

Wednesday, March 3; Exeter — Taking the lead in the first event and never relinquishing it, Exeter's track team defeated Andover, 55-40. Exeter, taking six firsts to Andover's five, built up a 14 point lead after the first two events as the Blue failed miserably in the field events. Exeter captured 31 of the possible 35 points in the field events as Andover could manage only one second and two thirds in the four events.

PA took firsts in each of the four distance events to stay within range of the Exies. However, Exeter won the final two events of the meet to clinch the victory.

Anderson, Wolfe Star  
Captain Trip Anderson and Bruce Wolfe led the Blue with a first and a second place finish apiece. Also taking firsts for Andover were Bob McDonald, Rick Roll and Morgan Flaherty. Anderson won the 45 yd. high hurdles in 5.9 seconds, equaling his career best time.

In the high jump, Anderson cleared the winning height of 6'0" but lost to Fullerton of Exeter on

fewer misses. Bruce Wolfe, after placing second in the mile, came back two events later to cop first in the 1000. His time of 2:22.7 in the event shaved six seconds off his previous best. In the 600, Bob McDonald crossed the finish line more than two seconds ahead of his nearest rival as he recorded his best time of 1:16.5.

Roll Wins Mile  
Rick Roll and Bruce Wolfe both finished the mile run in 4:41.0. However, the umpire awarded first place to Roll. In the 2 mile, Morgan Flaherty cut ten seconds from his previous best to win in 10:04.7. Taking third in the 2 mile was lower John Rogerson, who cut 20 seconds from his previous best to finish in 10:12.0. Ed McPherson placed second in the 50 yd. dash as he recorded a time of 5.9 seconds, one tenth of a second off the pace. Finishing second in the 1000 behind Bruce Wolf was Sam Butler, who crossed the line in 2:23.2. Taking thirds for Andover were Bill Bright, in the shot put, and Dean Roder, in the broad jump.

He also reset the old A-E mark held by Jon Noll of Andover. List's second place time of 56.7 missed the 13-14 national age group record by only three-tenths of a second.

Andover Firsts  
The Blue registered four more firsts during the meet. Andover's captain, Gil Caffray, outdistanced his opponent in the 100 freestyle, winning in a time of 51.3, which was his best time of the season.

Along with Caffray, both Peter Sachs and John Mesrobian captured first place honors. Sachs posted his best time of the year, winning the 100 breaststroke, in a time of 1:06.2, while Mesrobian picked up a win in the diving with a winning point total of 60.45. Andover's other win of the day came in the 200 Medley Relay. Sporting a team of Peter Sachs, Warren Murphy, Rick Moses, and Gil Caffray, the Blue won easily with a time of 1:44.8.

## PA B-Ball Falls Easily To Red, 78-61; Ends With Disappointing 7-13 Record

Saturday, March 6, Exeter — Led by the outstanding all-around performance of Craig Lewis, the Exeter basketball team defeated Andover's varsity, 78-61. An upper who came at mid-year, Lewis controlled play throughout the entire game scoring 24 points while dominating both boards.

Lewis, Pentowski, Lead Red  
Down 41-34 at the half, Andover took advantage of an Exeter cold streak during the first half of the third quarter to cut down the Red's lead to 41-38. Exeter's Kevin Watterson then scored a freethrow but baskets by Bob Kelley and Lew Howes tied the score, 42-42. Unable to control the Red's inside game, PA quickly fell behind once again as Lewis and captain David Pentowski both scored baskets. Bob Bianchi tallied to make the score 46-44, but Lewis then hit six straight points to pull his team away from the Blue. Playing without starting center and captain Gregg Meserole, who sustained an ankle injury in practice, the Blue was plagued by the inability to contain Lewis.

He frequently grabbed the first, second, and third rebounds on his own shots, while bringing down a preponderance of the team's overall rebounds. With this rebounding power, Exeter was able to trigger frequently a highly effective fast break.

With the score 56-49 and one and a half minutes remaining in the quarter, Lewis and Pentowski led a late scoring spurt as the Red coasted to a 60-51 edge at the end of the third quarter.

Exeter Outscores Blue  
During the fourth quarter, Exeter continued to dominate the game and consequently outscored the Blue, 18-9. Exeter guards Watterson and Pentowski combined for four points at the outset of the quarter to increase the Red lead to 64-51. Weldon Baird scored two of his four points, and Bob Kelley added two more to make the score 64-55. Lewis then scored three more to bring the score to 67-55. During the remainder of the game, Lewis and Pentowski combined for seven of Exeter's 11 points as the Red handed the Blue its thirteenth defeat of the season.

Andover Takes Lead  
Andover gained its only leads of the contest when it took a 2-0 and 6-4 edge from the outset of the first quarter. Lewis, along with another player who came at the mid-year, Bryan Nashold, then took control of the boards and the game as Exeter jumped ahead 10-8 on a basket by Nashold. Weldon Baird sunk a freethrow but Exeter con-

tinued to dominate as it took a 15-9 lead on baskets by Joe Metcalf and Watterson. Kelley and Lewis scored for Andover and Exeter, respectively, as the first quarter ended with the Red holding a 17-11 edge.

Second Quarter  
Pentowski quickly scored in the second quarter, but Andover came back with four points to make the score 19-15. Lewis scored the Red's next four points, making it 23-15, but the Blue then hit a remarkable hot streak through the remainder of the quarter to keep within range of the Red. Lewis began to control the inside on defense as well, and thus, the Blue had to go to the guards and less frequently, the forwards. In this quarter, upper Clem Hearey came off the bench to score all of his ten points and kept the Blue in the game.

Kelley Leading Scorer  
Bob Kelley once again, led the team in scoring and was also the game's high scorer as he tallied 26 points. He was followed by Hearey and then Howes who had seven. For Exeter, high scorer behind Lewis was Pentowski, who tallied 21 points. Nashold tallied nine and Metcalf, Exeter's high scorer in the first Andover-Exeter game, added eight.


