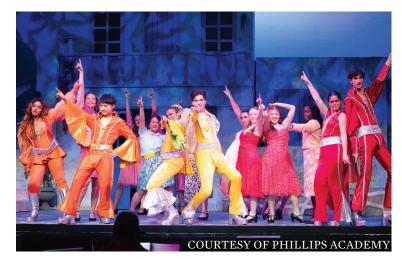
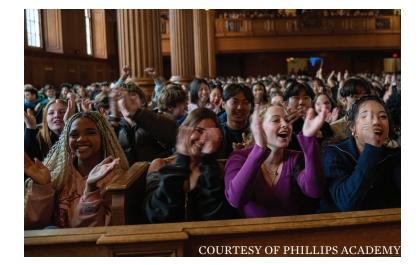

Gracie Aziabor '26 and Philip Meng '26 Elected 2025-2026 Student Body Co-Presidents

STAFF REPORT

Gracie Aziabor '26 and Philip Meng '26 were elected on April 11 to be the 2025-2026 Student Body Co-Presidents, hours after the final debate at All-School Meeting (ASM). Throughout Spring Term and over the summer, 2024-2025 Co-Presidents Saraya Angbazo '25 and Nate Liang '25 will help the pair transition into their new

Aziabor and Meng initially worked together as Student Representatives during their Junior year. Meng noted how their shared experience offered the pair a unique perspective into the inner workings of Andover, proving valuable as they now begin their tenure.

"[Being a Junior] class representative was really beneficial for me. I got to meet Gracie [who] has become one of my closest friends. Junior class representative really gave me an insight [into] how the school runs and how to work with the administration. Then, we took these two years off to really explore our interests. Now, we're back, and we have the necessary means to get the things that we're envisioning done," said Meng.

Beginning in January, the co-presidential race unfolded over multiple months, including crafting a platform, multiple rounds of voting, and a final debate. Reflecting on this long process, Meng highlighted the dedication and time that went into their cam-

"Gracie and I have been really putting in so much work for this since the beginning, honestly, there have been many nights where we've stayed up until 3:00 a.m. or 4:00 a.m. just getting ready and thinking about the things we were going to do. We are so excited to get started on all of this," said

Throughout their campaign, the pair focused on four initiatives: a digitized Add/Drop process, Equity, Balance, and Inclusion (EBI) reform for Juniors and Lowers, a club budget and handbook, and Susie's vouchers on birthdays for students. Aziabor shared her excitement to begin implementing their initiatives, such as the club handbook, which aims to centralize policies about running a club.

"I'm really excited to start

working on the club handbook, which I feel like a lot of people would assume is less enticing on our platform. It's more of behindthe-scenes work. I'm excited to really get going, and that's one of those things that I know we can hit the ground running on and start thinking about what we want to include. I'm so honored to be chosen for this, and I want to start as soon as possible," said Aziabor. Angbazo pointed out her fa-

vorite initiatives from the pair's platform and applauded their ability to build upon the work of Co-Presidents before them.

"[Their club budget and handbook initiative is such an amazing way to build on what Nate, Mr. [Christopher] Capano, [Director of Student Activities], the Student Activities Office, and I did this year with ClubHub. As Co-Presidents, it's a big skill to be able to work with what is already existing at Andover and just to refine them and make it even better. And I think that is like a great example of great Co-President work," said Angbazo.

From their experience of being the 2024-2025 Student Body Co-Presidents, the outgoing pair offered a few words of advice for how Aziabor and Meng could achieve success during their tenure. Angbazo emphasized the need to accept rejection, as there are a large number of factors that are required for each proposed initiative, while Liang pushed the pair to begin advocating for change immediately.

"I would say get started early. Even though their terms don't technically start until the fall

[when] people get back to campus in September, [I suggest] just go for it. Especially because Saraya and I are here to get them started on their term and work with them through May, [a piece of advice is to really start having conversations with different faculty about their ideas as soon as possible because the year goes by fast," said

Reflecting on their campaign, Aziabor and Meng expressed their gratitude for the Andover community throughout the election process and shared their eagerness to step into their new roles.

'I would like to say thank you to the student body for believing in us and for really riding with us along the whole... The support and love that I've felt from the end of the community across these past couple of months really warms my heart, and it makes me so grateful to call myself an Andover student," said Aziabor.

Meng added, "Thank [you to] all of the people who have supported us along the way: all the students, all of our friends, and all the faculty who have been able to talk to and have helped us walk through our ideas. Most of all, we're just so excited. There's so much to do, and there's so much to get started on."

Student cell phones should be silenced and out of sight 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, Friday & 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Wednesday.

Students may access their phones in an emergency or in their dorm room, the GW mailroom/locker area, or Susie's.

From 3 p.m. (1 p.m. on Wednesday) until 8 p.m. on school days, and on Saturday and Sunday, students may access their phones in most spaces, except for: school commitments, while on the move, when in Silent, in line at Commons, restrooms, or locker rooms.

After 8 p.m. on evenings before days with classes, students may not access their phones in a supervised place of study or in dormitory common rooms.

By 11 p.m. on evenings before days with classes, 9th and 10th graders must place their phones in a charging station outside of their room. Students may access their phones at 6 a.m.

If a student has their phone out during prohibited hours or in phone-free spaces, an adult will take the phone and bring it to the Dean of Students Office, where the student can pick it up at 3 p.m.

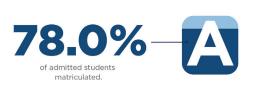


Boarding vs. Day Students

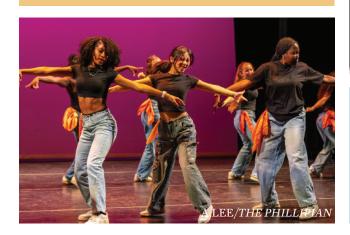

1. George Washington Hall (GW)

First floor lobby features fun and vibrant seating. GW also houses Andover's mailroom, performance theaters, day student lockers, and administrative offices.

2. Addison Gallery of American Art

Quiet study environment amongts shelves of art history books. Need a break? Stroll through the Addison's traveling exhibitions and permanent collections. Limited hours.

3. Morse Hall

Math, computer science, and statistics help offered on most weeknights. Connected to Morse is the Community and Multicultural Diversity (CaMD) office that offers spaces for various clubs, affinity groups, and collaborative study.

4. Pearson Hall

Chalkboards and wooden desks - home to Andover's historic classical language classrooms. Pearson also houses the Academic Skills Center (ASC) that offers accessibility services, study help, and quiet rooms for working.

5. Oliver Wendell Holmes Library (OWHL)

A wide variety of study spaces. Ask for research help from librarians at the front desk, reserve a study room, or craft projects in the Makerspace.

6. Gelb Science Center

Science help offered on most weeknights. Large whiteboards and seating can be found in the Gelb hallways for collaborative study.

7. Paresky Commons

Contains four main seating areas; sit anywhere you'd like with anyone you want. The bottom-left quadrant of the building, nicknamed "Lower Left," is the quietest and often the most studious. Work on a group project over food and drinks.

8. Pan Athletic Center

Colorful booth-style and table seating in an open environment. Stop by the newly-built pool, dance studios, and wrestling facilities in the Pan if you have the chance!

9. Snyder Center

Second floor offers modern seating while overlooking the indoor track, squash courts, and Phelps stadium.

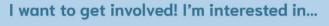


Wellness, Drugs & Alcohol, Sex, Campus Culture, Community Diversity, and Discipline.
