Exeter Letter.

JANUARY 27.

The athletic meet of the Lower Middle Class was held Wednesday, January 20. Members of the Faculty acted as judges and time-keeper, and Cameron '97 had general supervision. The events were: 20-yard dash, won by Syphax, Cleveland being a close second; standing high jump, won by Little; shot put, won by Stickney; running high jump, won by Little, with Tufts second; standing broad jump, Little first, Blizzard second; running broad jump, won by Little; fence vault, Little first, Stickney second; potato race, run in three preliminary heats and a final, Stickney first, ruled out on a foul, won by Cleveland, Syphax second. The Upper Middle class holds its meet this afternoon, in the gymnasium, with the same events as in the above, with the addition of the pole vault. The number of entries for the potato race is so great that the committee has decided to divide it into light and heavy weights, certainly an amusing feature. The class elected Sawyer captain, Saturday, in place of Jones, resigned.

The candidates for the base-ball team have been practicing daily in the gymnasium. The material seems to be good, and the new men are making a much better showing than was anticipated.

A concert will be given by the Glee and Banjo Clubs, Friday, February 12. There will be vocal and instrumental solos, and some talk has been made of having a reader. The proceeds will go towards defraying the expenses of the Athletic Association.

A design for the Senior class has been accepted. It was drawn by G. N. Shorey, a member of the class. The enamel will be orange and black, the class colors, with gold lettering.

The Supper Committee of the Senior class has decided to have the annual class banquet take place February 26.

The Upper Middle class has decided to hold a meeting Saturday, to arrange for its class supper.

A committee under chairmanship of Lanagan '98, has been busily engaged since the beginning of the term in recataloguing the Golden Branch Library. The system used in the past was found wholly inadequate to the needs of the society. A modification of the Dewey system has been introduced by which the books are cata-

logued under the following heads: History, biography, travels, fiction, poetry, philosophy, sociology, religion, science, and general literature. The size of the library has necessitated much steady labor on the part of the committee, which will, however, be greatly appreciated by the members of the society.—THE EXONIAN.

Chinese Encyclopedia

Dr. John Fryer, of the Department of Oriental Languages at the University of California, has come into possession of a volume of the famous encyclopedia published in China in 1726, and containing at that time 5000 volumes, which were indexed in twenty volumes. The book is known as the "Tu-shu-chi Ch'eng" and is one of the largest literary works ever produced in the world. The subjects treated comprise the entire sum of knowledge possessed in China, classified under the heads of astronomy and mathematics, physical and political geography, human relationship, science and inanimate nature, metaphysics and doctrinal philosophy and political economy.—*Ex.*

Yale is soon to hold a billiard and pool tournament.

The annual reunion and banquet of the Theological Seminary Alumni will be held in Young's Hotel, Boston, Monday evening, February 8th. Short addresses will be given by several of the members.

Theodore Roosevelt, New York's Police Commissioner, spoke at Princeton last week on "An Object Lesson in Municipal Reform." The address was given under the auspices of the Princeton Civil Service Reform Club.

The University of Illinois should have the honor of having established the first adequately equipped freshwater biological station in America. The center of operations is a large boat, roomy enough for fifteen workers. This floating laboratory was moored at Quiver Lake, two miles north of Havana, during the summer.

The Harvard Golf Club has decided to join the Intercollegiate Golf Association and to enter a team at the tournament to be held in April.

At present there are twenty-one German Universities with an enrollment of 27,669 students. The University of Berlin heads the list with an attendance of 8,343, while the smallest is the University of Munster with 399 students.

George H. Nettleton, P. A. '92, Yale '96, is going abroad for a year of study in Germany. He contributed the article on Yale for Frank Leslie's Popular Monthly, the first of a series of articles on American Universities and Colleges.

Contrary to the usual custom, the Yale seniors will not wear caps and gowns until after March 1st. This change has been made at the order of the '97 cap and gown committee, which deems it inadvisable for them to be worn until the cold weather is practically over.

The University of Virginia base-ball team will take a more extended Northern vacation trip this year than ever before playing Pennsylvania at Philadelphia, Princeton at Princeton, Cornell at Ithaca, Trinity at New York, Yale at New Haven and Harvard at Cambridge.

The council of the University Athletic Club, which has undertaken the management of the Yale-Princeton foot-ball games, has reported in favor of taking future games away from New York. The temptation to speculation in tickets, the lack of suitable grounds and the injurious effects upon the students are given as some of the causes for this action.
