Both shells are to be of cedar and all three boats will be English-rigged with the exception of the cross-seating.

March Mirror.

The March number of the *Mirror* which appeared yesterday is abounding in good articles and is one of the most interesting issues which has been presented this year. There are several stories which show considerable literary merit besides being interesting reading.

The opening article is by James G. K. McClure, an alumnus of the class of '66, and is a short sketch of "one of Andover's worthies," Archie Bach, who was the captain, of the first really established school base-ball team.

"The Silver Tankard" by George Lauder, Jr., and "At the Sweizer Hof" by Milton Simon, are two stories worthy of especial mention both for bright clear diction and good original plot.

John F. Ferry has written a very interesting article on "Some of Nature's Color Devices" which is a treatise on a subject of natural history interest.

Poetry is represented by "The Celebration of the Shades" by Frank H. Lehman which is very well composed and much better than the majority of such attempts. "Constatia" by Ray Morris is a very sweet little story and while the subject is very old it is one which will never be tiresome especially when as well written as is this one.

In the editorial column two questions of great importance at the present time are discussed, whether it be advisable for the school to have a trainer and concerning class room dishonesty. They are both matters which will bear considerable discussion and it would be well for every fellow in the school to read them.

The number closes with the "Month" "Mirage" Exchange, Book Review and "Ivy," which are of usual interest.

The rumors about most of last year's players on the Indian team going to other colleges are erroneous. Metoxen, Cayou, B. Pierce and all the other stars will be back. Several colleges have objected to playing against the Indians both because they have no four year rule and also because the Indian school is not a college. The latter is overcome by the fact that football has only been played there for three years and that a man rarely attends for more than four years.

We are sorry to learn that the proposed chess match between Worcester and Andover will not be accomplished. It is greatly to be regretted, as a chess match would do much to strengthen the friendly spirit already existing between the two schools. The Chess Club is to be congratulated on the rapid stride it has made during the past year and we hope that by next year we shall be able to add chess to the other interscholastic meets with Exeter.

Earnest work is being done by the candidates for the naval academy crews at Annapolis. In the absence of a rowing tank, the candidates are taught the stroke in the pool of the natatorium, where a pair-oared shell has been rigged. As soon as the weather permits, work on the river will be begun. Armstrong, P. S. '92, Yale '95 S is coaching the candidates. Three races have positively been arranged—with Pennsylvania, Columbia and the Cornell second crew — and an effort is being made to arrange one with Wisconsin. All of last year's Annapolis crew, with the exception of Captain Palmer who graduated last June, are in training again this year.

W. C. Booth '96, Princeton 19' has been elected vice-president of his class, and A. Hillebrand '96, Princeton 19', secretary.

The Young Men's Christian Association, of the University of California, is trying to prevent the insertion of liquor advertisements in the "Blue and Gold," the college annual.

Columbia University is to have a building which is to combine under its one roof a gymnasium, an academic theater; a banquet hall, a power house, and various rooms for the use of college organizations.

The committee on appropriations of the New Hampshire legislature gave a hearing Tuesday evening on the joint resolution introduced by Mr. Huntington appropriating \$10,000 a year for two years for the use of Dartmouth College. Gen. Frank S. Streeter, of the trustees and President Tucker spoke on behalf of the college. Dr. Tucker said that the increased number of students made the expenditures of the College greater and that while it costs \$90,000 to run the College, yet the maximum income from tuition, scholarships and invested funds is 75,000.

Lafayette and Cornell have completed a two-years' agreement in base-ball and foot-ball.

Yale has nine of last year's base-ball team in college this year, seven of whom have played in championship games. They are Greenway, Simmons, and Hecker, pitchers; Murphy, catcher; Bartlett, de Saulles, Hazen and Letton, infield; and Captain Keator in the outfield.

The subject for the U. of P. Cornell Debate as announced is: Resolved, "That the United States and the several States should establish courts of compulsory adjustment of the disputes between employees and private corporations which possess franchises of a public nature."

Nearly half of those students who do not offer Greek at admission to the Harvard examinations fail to enter, and eighty-one per cent. of all the candidates for admission offer the history of Greece and Rome rather than the history of England and the United States.

A petition is being circulated in the Sheffield Scientific School to lengthen the course of the school to four years. The petition is receiving a large number of signatures and will be presented before the faculty as soon as it has been circulated through the Sheffield classes.

The University of Texas has recently received the most valuable gift in its history, a library of 25,000 volumes, valued at \$100,000. The donor was Swante Palmer, the Swedish Vice Consul at Austin, Texas, who has spent fifty years in the collection of these books, and has secured many of the rarest treasures of New York, London and Edinburgh.

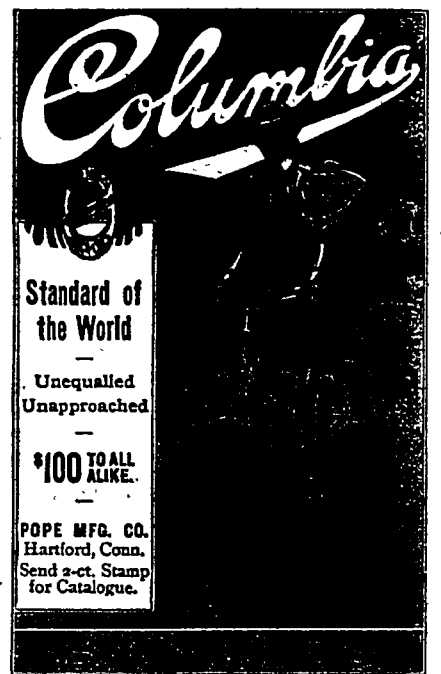
