## ANDOVER-WORCESTER ACADEMY

The Third Annual Meet Goes to Worcester. Score 631-2-401-2.

Last Saturday, Andover was again defeated on the track by Worcester. The weather conditions were perfect for fast time and as a consequence, three records fell and two others were tied in the track events, and the record for the shot put was broken.

W. H. Jones did the best work for Andover winning easily in the 100 and 220-yds. dashes. In the former he broke the record which he established last year by 1-5 of a second and he tied his record in the 220. Capt. Richardson ran one of the prettiest races of the day in the 880. He won easily and broke the record made by W. T. Laing P. A. '95 which had stood for two years. Belding also ran a good race in his event.

In the mile, Woodbine won a pretty and exciting race and Tenney was a close second. Capt. Richardson ran an excellent race in his event and would have secured a place if he had not been fouled by McPherson. The judges however refused to recognize the foul. Schweppe and Kimball ran well in the quarter and secured second and third places for Andover.

Peter did fine work and ran a close second in the best race of the day, the 120-yds. hurdle. A new record was established in this event, 17 s. flat. Peter also won second in the low hurdles and third in the 100-yd. dash. Cady was a good third in both hurdles. Cowdrey finished a close third in the 220-yd. dash. Wells secured third place in the two mile bicycle race which was ridden in good time.

In the field events, Ellis secured third, in the hammer throw, shot put and high jump. He surpassed his best previous record in the hammer throw, by throwing 112 ft. 9 in. Rowland showed up well in the pole vault and tied with Manning of Worcester for second place.

On the track the score was 36 to 28 in favor of Andover. Worcester won by remarkable performances in the field events.

The following men won for Worcester, Firsts, W. Hersey (2), Campbell (2). Overman, W. Howe, Kendal. Seconds, G. Hersey (2), Gage, Manning, Spear and Norris. Thirds, Kinsley and McPherson. The high jump was a tie between Kendal and C. H. R. Howe and was not jumped

off. Worcester won all three places in the broad jump and the contestants G. Hersey, W. Hersey and Kendal did not jump it off.

## ANDOVER-WORCESTER POLY. INS.

Andover Wins Another Game. Score 15-2.

The game last Saturday with Worcester Poly. Ins. resulted in an easy victory for the home team. Andover did not play as snappy a game as usual in the field, eight errors being scored against the team. Worcester went to pieces at critical points in the game and the team work was at times rather ragged. The home team played a very strong game at the bat, while Worcester was decidedly weak in this respect.

Stephenson, who occupied the box first for Andover, played his usual steady game. Barnwell's bunting and Pingree's base running were features of the game. Capt. French led it at the bat and had four hits with a total of seven bases to his credit. Hawkins, who relieved Stephenson in the seventh was very effective.

For Worcester, Smith covered first in good form, accepting fourteen chances without an error. Curtis played a good game and his throwing to bases was one of the features. Sanders was hit freely.

The home team failed to score in the first. Elliot started the second with a single, advanced to third on Stephenson's hit and scored on Barnwell's bunt. French then hit the ball for two bases, sending Barnwell and Phillips across the rubber. A passed ball by Curtis allowed Jones and French to score.

Saunders opened the fourth by giving a base on balls to Phillips who went out on second. Barnwell scored on Jones's hit. A three bagger by French and a single by Pingree netted the home team two runs. Pingree stole home prettily and Waddell and Elliot crossed the plate on errors by Walsh and Curtis.

Andover scored three more in the eighth. After Hawkins had struck out, French began with a single, advanced to second on Clark's error and scored on Pingree's hit. With the bases full Stephenson made a clean two bagger sending two men across the plate.

Barnwell commenced the ninth with a single, was sacrificed to second by French and scored on Pingree's hit.

Worcester failed to score in the first. In the second Sanders hit safely, advanced to third on Wood's single and Barnwell's error and scored on a passed ball. Walsh scored the

last run for the visitors on errors by Waddell and Phillips and a sacrifice hit by Clark.

The visitors failed to score after the second on account of their inability to hit the ball.

We have a good chance of defeating Exeter Saturday, but if we are to win from Worcester and in the Inter Scholastic Meets in future we must give stronger support to the team, not only financially but by our efforts.

## '98-'99 Game To-day.

This afternoon the two middle classes meet for their annual game and an interesting and exciting time is expected. '98 has the advantage in experience and is also stronger at the bat. It is impossible to tell how the in-fields will play as the conditions under which the game is played may make a very great difference in the comparative strength. The '98 team have adopted Yale grey suits, with red '98 on the shirt, red and black jersey stockings and white sweater with a red '98.

Two gentlemen of the Y. M. C. A. of Harvard University addressed the students in the Academy Chapel Sunday afternoon. Both of the addresses were very interesting and contained much that was beneficial, pertaining to the religious, as well as the practical side of life.

The ball game that was scheduled for last Thursday with Brown University was postponed indefinitely on account of the unfavorable weather.

The preliminary contest for the Merrill prizes in declamations was held last Wednesday evening in the Academy Chapel. Of the twenty-four contestants the following were chosen by the three judges to compete in the final contest on the 21st of June: From the Senior Class, T. G. Brown, Gould, Hayden and James; from the Upper Middle Class, Bruce,

Engel, Gibson, Kendall; Leonard, Reeves, Roberts and Wheelock. The alternates chosen were Dearborn '97 and Cable '98.

At a school meeting in the chapel Thursday morning subscriptions for seven hundred and forty copies of the June number of the "Lit." were taken. This issue will begin the republication of Exeter's Literary monthly.

The twelve mile bicycle road race on last Saturday was entered by seven contestants. Greene, '00 with a three minute handicap, rode a plucky race, making the best time: 34 mts. 36 sec. The other contestants were DeCorter '97, Hardy '98, Wood '98, Call '98, Ford '99 and Robinson '99.

Mr. Sinclair, a member of the Faculty of Harvard University, Washington, D. C., made a few amusing and interesting remarks to the students in chapel Monday morning.

Last Saturday Exeter easily won the ball game, against Vermont Academy, with a score of 8-0. Carter pitched a steady game and was ably supported by the rest of the players. The work of Miller behind the bat and Roberts on first base was very commendable, the latter having 12 put-outs to his credit.
