ANDOVER WINS!

Andover Wins at Football for the First Time since the Beginning of the Series.

Yesterday afternoon Andover defeated her old rival, Lawrenceville, by the above score. The result of the game was a surprise to all but it brought forth Andover's true strength and showed what her men could do when she had her full team and with the weather dry. The weather was perfect for a foot-ball game but the ground was frozen which caused many delays as a great number of men were hurt in falling.

Too much praise cannot be bestowed on the whole Lawrenceville team for the plucky game they put up against such strong odds. They died hard and in years to come every one will recall their pluck. Andover played the best game seen on the campus for a long while, each man getting into every play with remarkable quickness.

Our team outweighed their opponents to a man and this partly is the cause of the large score as the Lawrenceville line could not withstand the heavy plunges made by our backs.

The Lawrenceville tackles were weak and Roby and Burdick gained almost at will through them. Her ends played a strong game on the first half but could not get into the interference in the second. The backs all played well, especially Griggs and Hannum, the former being the most aggressive until he was injured and compelled to leave the game. For Andover, Burdick, Elliot, Quinby and Roby played best. Burdick and Roby fairly outdid themselves in making long runs, Burdick making one of 70 yards and another of 55 yards. Elliot punted well and bucked the line hard, gaining his length or more every time when the ball was given to him. Quinby passed well, ran the team with excellent judgment and blocked in a way that seemed wonderful for so light a man. Holt and Davis played the best of the line men. The latter kicked seven goals in succession, many of them being difficult ones.

1ST HALF.

At 2.25 Andover lined up in possession of the southern goal and the kick-off. Elliot kicked-off to Gilmore who was downed by Abbott with no gain. Lawrenceville could not gain the necessary 5 yards so Hannum punted. Elliot caught on P. A.'s 40 yard line but gained little. Roby and Burdick gained 12 yards in the next two plays and Elliot 3 more through the centre. At this point Andover was given 5 yards for offside play and on the next play she received 5 more for the same offense. Our backs made long gains through Lawrenceville which placed the ball on the 15 yard line. Gilmore was hurt but sandily kept on. Burdick made two gains of 6 yards each. Here Lawrenceville took a brace and held for downs. Hannum got 10 yards on a fake kick. In the next 3 plays she failed to gain and resorted to a punt, Quimby catching. He gained 5 yards. Burdick gained 4 on the hole opened by Grinnell, and Roby ran 25 yards around right end for a touch-down. Davis kicked a goal. Score 6-0. Time 9 minutes.

Lawrenceville kicked off to Elliot on the 10 yard line, and he gained 15. Quimby added 10 more on a double pass. Lawrenceville obtained the ball on downs on our 35 yard line.

In the third play Hannum fumbled and Holt dropped on the ball. Elliot kicked 45 yards to Griggs, who gained 20 yards, being downed by Quinby. This places the ball in the middle of the field. Griggs encircled Schreiber's end for 30 yards. On a quarter-back kick Lawrenceville got 20 more. Elliott returned the punt for 15 yards. Here Lawrenceville played at her best. On a formation play Griggs netted 8 yards around left end. The ball was on our two yard line. Twice the Lawrenceville backs failed to gain, but in the play Donahay was pushed over the line for a touch-down. Hannum failed at goal. Score 6-4.

Andover kicked off to Hannum who recovered 10 yards before he was tackled by Burdick. The Lawrenceville full-back punted for 15 yards to Burdick who failed to gain. On the next down Andover got 15 yards for offside play. The Andover backs commenced hammering the Lawrenceville line with telling effect and soon placed the ball on the 5-yard line from which Roby made a touchdown through right tackle. Davis kicked goal. Score 12-0.

Hannum kicked off to Burdick who passed the ball to Schreiber, who gained 20 yards. Andover failed to gain and on the third down Elliot punted 35 yards. Griggs caught and gained 15 yards. Abbott was injured and Matthews substituted. Griggs netted 5 yards around left end which Hannum followed up with 4 more through centre. Andover obtained the ball on downs on her 35-yard line. Elliot was sent through the centre for 5 yards. On the next play Andover fumbled and Gilmore fell on the ball. Hannum kicked 35 yards to Elliot who regained 22 yards on the catch. Again Andover began her irresistible attacks on her opponent's centre. Burdick encircled right end for 25 yards and Roby left for 20 yards. Quinby gained five more on a double pass and Roby went through right tackle for 7 yards. This placed the ball on the 8-yard line. Burdick gained 5 yards through left guard and then Roby went over the line for the third touchdown. The try at goal was successful. Score 18-4. Matthews gained 15 yards on his catch of the kick-off. Burdick, behind beautiful interference, ran 55 yards around right end. Soon after the first half ended.

SECOND HALF.

Quinby gained 15 yards on his catch of the opening kick-off in the second half, and Burdick followed with a 6-yard gain around right end. Roby covered 15 yards through right tackle and gained the same distance around left end. Elliott was hurt but resumed play. Roby again encircled left end for 25 yards on a tackle formation play and Burdick followed with 15 yards through left tackle. This placed the ball on Lawrenceville's 20-yard line. Sterritt took Griggs' place at left half. Roby and Burdick each gained 7 yards and then Roby ran over for a touch-down. Davis kicked a goal. Score 24-4.

Hannum's kick-off was caught by Elliott who gained 25 yards before being downed. Burdick and Davis made short gains. Roby and Burdick gained 8 and 12 yards respectively around right and left ends. On the next play Burdick ran 50 yards for a touch-down around right end, Quinby's interference greatly assisting him. Davis' trial at goal was successful. Score 30-4. There remained 10 minutes of play.

Lawrenceville's kick-off was re-

ceived by Quinby, who gained 20 yards. Burdick ran 70 yards through the hole opened up by Davis and made a touch-down. Davis kicks goal. Score 36-4.

On Lawrenceville's last kick-off Elliott gained 20 yards which Roby followed up with 8 yards through right tackle. For two downs Andover failed to gain but on the third Roby gained 40 yards through right tackle again. On the next three plays Burdick gained 5 yards, Roby 8 yards and Burdick 5. The ball was on Lawrenceville's 25-yard line. Andover loses the ball on a forward pass. Hannum tried right tackle but lost 10 yards, and he then punted 30 yards to Quinby who recovered 5 yards. Roby went around left end for 15 yards, placing the ball on the 15-yard mark, from which he was pushed over for a touch-down. Davis kicked his seventh successive goal. Score 42-4. Before teams could line up again time was called.

Morton St, 18, Phillips St. 0.

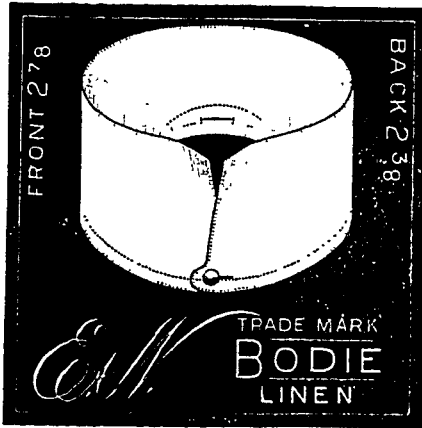
Morton Street easily defeated Phillips Street by the above score last Wednesday, in the first of the championship series. The game was called at two o'clock.

Morton Street kicked off but soon recovered the ball on the 20 yard line. After several small gains, Whitney was sent around right end for a touch-down, Ward kicked goal. 6-0. Morton Street advanced the ball to the center of the field from the kick-off, but here Phillips Street recovered the ball on a fumble. Morton Street held for downs, and rushed the ball to Phillips Street 2 yard line. Here Phillips Street held for two downs, but on third Whitney was pushed over for second touchdown. Ward kicked goal. 12-0. The half ended with Phillips Street ball on 30 yard line. Score 12-0.

Phillips Street kicked off, and Manning returned. Phillips Street rushed the ball to centre of the field, Morton Street held for downs. Whitney picked the ball up on a fumble and ran 50 yards for third touch-down. Ward kicked goal. 18-0.

For the remainder of the half there was no more scoring and the ball changed hands several times. Manning punted just before time was called to Phillips Street's 10 yard line. The game ended with Phillip's Street ball on 15 yard line.

The *New York Times'* weekly edition for this week, contained cuts of the 'Varsity and of Baird, Booth, Kelly, Bannard and Wheeler. It also had a cut of the Yale team.

The final plans for the new athletic field at Wesleyan have been adopted. They provide for a quarter-mile track surrounding the base-ball field. During the foot-ball season the diamond will be covered with tan-bark so that it will not receive injury for base-ball.
