Andover 3, Picked Nine 1.

Andover defeated a picked team last Wednesday by the above score. Andover played a slow game, and the picked team's only run was made by Crowley on a succession of errors. Andover was weak at the bat, and Jones lost two easy chances on third. Condon for the picked team did good stick work, securing a hit every time he was at bat. Quinby on second played the best fielding game, having three put outs and five assists without an error to his credit. But six innings were played. Waddell's throwing to bases was especially accurate.

In the second inning Waddell hit and crossed the plate on Chapman's single.

In the third, Crowley reached first on Jones' error, went to third on a sacrifice and a wild pitch, and stole home.

Andover scored twice in the fourth, making the final score 3-1. Ward walked to first and scored on Jones' double. Jones also added one more in this inning on Crowley's error.

Desiring to stimulate to their best efforts, the members of the P. A. Base Ball team, and in that way to contribute to a successful season and promote a healthy athletic spirit in the school: Thereby offer a prize to be known as "The Chase Trophy," to be presented to that member of the team, who, in the estimation of the school has contributed most to the success of the season of 1898. The presentation to be subject to the following conditions:

I. The vote by the school to determine the winner of this trophy shall be taken on Tuesday, June 14; or in case of postponement of the Exeter game, on the morning of the second day following that contest.

II. Only those who are regularly enrolled students of Phillips Academy on the day of voting shall be entitled to vote in this contest.

While individual work in the most important contests should be given due consideration, it should be borne in mind that "the man who contributes most to the success" of the team is not necessarily the one who happens to excel in a particular game, however important that game in itself may be. Faithful and conscientious work throughout the entire season, strict training, and a willingness to sacrifice personal records and ambitions for the best welfare of the team, are of fully as much importance in securing ultimate victory as are those qualities by which the average spectator judges a good ball player.

Andover and Exeter meet on the campus this afternoon at 2.30 p. m. for the 17th annual contest in baseball. On the other hand Andover has a stronger team than last season.

Communication.

The best results are not secured by the present manner of electing the captains of the class baseball teams. A painting of an Andover-Exeter game on the Andover campus has been placed in the hall of the Academy Building. The picture was painted by L. R. Norton and is for sale.



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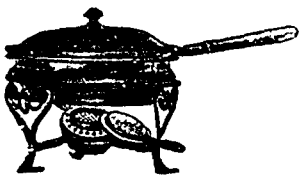

The late Miss Philena McKeen by her will, leaves \$2500 to Abbot Academy for an Endowment fund in the department of art, more especially the history and philosophy of art.

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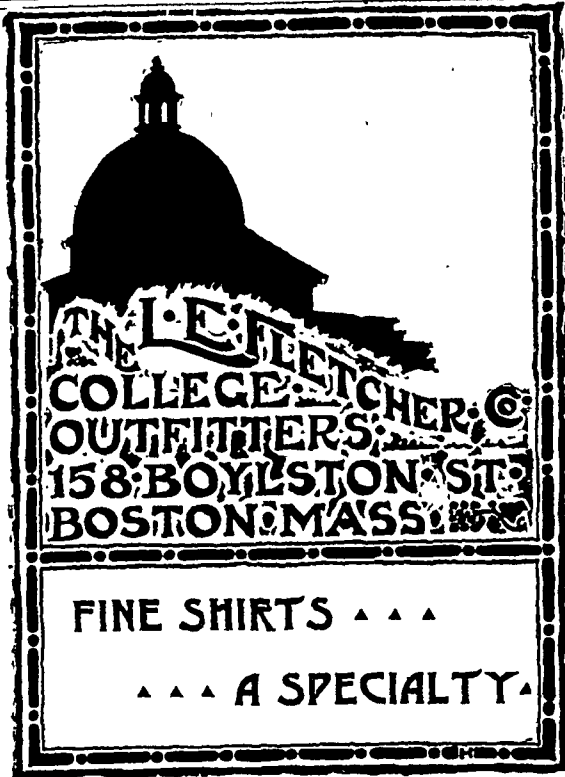

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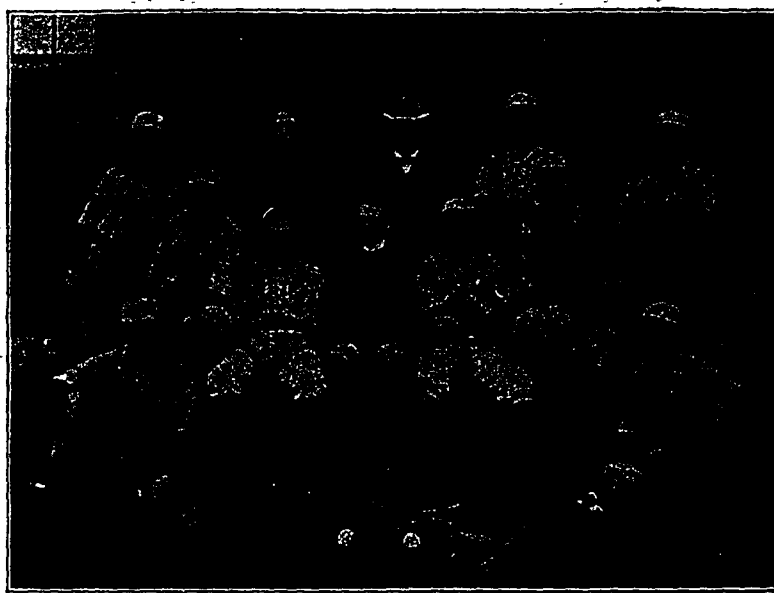

ANDOVER TEAM.

WADDELL.

L. D. Waddell '98, catcher, has played on the school team four years. He filled the position of right field in '95 and '96, and since then he has caught. As captain of the team this year, Waddell has, by his fidelity and persistent loyalty, inspired the admiration of his men. In his playing, Waddell is very cool and steadies the team. He comes from Parsippany, N. J. He is 19 years old and is 5 ft. 9 in. tall. He will enter Yale next fall.

QUINBY.

F. L. Quinby '98 of New York City plays second base. He filled the same position on the team in '96 and last year he played shortstop on the '98 class team. Quinby is a steady fielder, a sure hitter, and the best base-runner on the team. He has played quarterback on the football team for the past two years and was elected captain for next year but resigned as he will enter Yale in the fall. Quinby is 19 years of age and is 5 ft. 8 in. in height.

CHAPMAN.

C. E. Chapman '98 of Franklin, N. H., has filled his position at the initial bag for the past two years. Chapman fields his position excellently and bats

fairly well. Last year he was considered one of the surest hitters on the team but he has not been using the stick in his old time form. Chapman is 18 years of age and is 5 ft. 11 in. tall. He will enter Princeton in the fall.

BARNWELL.

A. Barnwell, Jr., '99 has played on the team for three years. For the past two years he has played centre field. Barnwell is a very fast, sure fielder and his throws from deep centre to the plate are sometimes remarkable. He comes to Andover from Charleston, S. C., is 18 years of age and stands 6 ft. in height. Yale is his choice.

E. C. Corse '98 comes to Phillips Andover from Richford, Vt., where he played on the High School team. Corse has held the position of right field for two years. He is also substitute catcher. Corse is a good fielder and wields the stick with accuracy. He caught on the '98 class team last year. Corse is 19 years of age and is 5 ft. 8 in. in height. Princeton is his college.

STEPHENSON.

G. G. Stephenson, Jr., 1900 has occupied the box for two years. He has good speed and well controlled curves. He has proved himself to be

very effective against the best college batters. Stephenson fields his position to perfection, plays a cool game and is the most versatile player on the team. He comes from Brooklyn, N. Y., is 18 years of age and is 5 ft. 10 in. in height. He will go to Yale.

JONES.

E. A. Jones '99 of Franklin, N. H., was first substitute on the team last year. He played left field this year until the middle of the season when he was put in charge of third base, where he has shown himself to be very competent. 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Andover Wins 8-2

Andover Wins from Her Old Rival, Exeter, in a Well Played Game.

At about 2.15 the crowd began to assemble at the field. The Exonians were ranged along the bleachers on first base line while the supporters of the blue took the stands near third base. A strong wind was blowing toward home plate, making the dust fly in clouds; otherwise the day was admirable for the game. The mascot which the Exonians had brought with them in the form of a goat was very conspicuous.

At 2.30 the Exeter team came on the field amid loud cheers from their supporters. After preliminary practice by both teams the umpire called the game.

Andover took the bat. Quinby leads off for Andover at the bat. Quinby struck out. Stephenson hit to Guernsey and was put out at first. Corse hit to W. Barker who shut him out at first.

Exeter sent Little first to bat who hit to Stephenson and died at first. Stephenson struck W. Barker out in good shape. After having two strikes against him, Weeks was hit on the shoulder and gained first base. Waddell failed to catch a low ball and Weeks would have secured third base had not Waddell, by a beautiful throw to Jones, put him out, retiring the side.
