Andover 10, M. I. T. 0.

✓ Saturday, in the first hockey game of the season, Andover defeated Massachusetts Institute of Technology by the score of 10 goals to 0.

The visitors were severely handicapped by the loss of two of their men who were unable to accompany the team. Owing to this and the necessity of substituting two Andover players, Hitchcock and Burke, team work was entirely lacking.

Andover, on the contrary, showed excellent team work, and especially in the first half, clearly outclassed their opponents. The best work for Andover was done by Captain Snow, Ostby and Maynard. For M. I. T., Smith and Burr excelled.

The game was called at 3 o'clock by Referee Perkins. In a few quick plays in which Snow's work was evident, Maynard scored a goal and the same players soon repeated the performance. Andover seemed to score nearly at will and at the end of the first half the score stood Andover 7, M. I. T. 0.

In the second half M. I. T. improved and fought hard for a goal but were unsuccessful. Andover seemed to lose some of her dash and failed to score until near the end of the half; then Snow made two in quick succession, and Ostby made one. The final score was Andover 10 goals, M. I. T. 0.

Class in Elocution

The class in elocution under Professor Churchill will meet to-morrow (Thursday) afternoon at 2 o'clock in Room 9.

This class is intended for Middlers, but other members of the school, especially seniors, can become members of the class.

The object of the class is to develop the voice by a system of vocal culture; to assist the interpreting of written language through the principals of oral reading; to give hints in declamation and extemporaneous speaking. New subjects will be introduced which the Seniors did not have in the Fall Course.

A small pamphlet gotten out by Professor Churchill is used as a text book. The class must co-operate in a practical way with the instructor.

Chess Club.

The annual Chess Tournament for the championship of the school, and to select the Chess team, will be begun the last of this week. All those desiring to enter this tournament must hand in their names to one of the officers of the club, either H. C. Hall '99 or Fox, before Friday night. As soon as all the names are in, the schedule of the games will be made out, and play started as soon as possible. The winner of the tournament will receive a golden "castle" as a prize, and the five men who make the best showing will constitute the regular team. As soon as this team shall have been chosen, it will probably play a series of tournaments, against one of the Harvard class-teams, and later a match with Exeter. Last year the Exeter match could not be arranged, but it is hoped nothing will interfere this year with it.

Everyone in school who is at all interested in chess, whether he has had experience or not, should enter the tournament.

A Lecture on Pompeii

At the invitation of the Philomathean Society Assistant-Professor Clifford H. Moore of Harvard University will deliver an illustrated lecture on Pompeii in the Chapel, Friday evening, January 27, at 7.45.

Mr. Moore was Professor of Greek here in the Academy from 1892 to '94 and Assistant-Professor at Chicago University from '94 to '97. While holding this position at Chicago University he went abroad and received the degree of Ph. D. at the University of Munich. He came to Harvard as Assistant-Professor of Latin and Greek in September 1898.

Professor Moore has lectured extensively in the West, and all who attend the lecture Friday evening can expect a rare treat. The Abbot Academy students will be present and invitation is extended to the townspeople.

Board Track

The contract has been awarded for building the board track, which is to be an eighth of a mile in length and three feet wide, except on one side which will be twice that width. The track will be built in front of the present track house, extending down as far as the back-stops of the tennis courts and curving around into the oval. It will probably be ready for use by the thirtieth of this month.

Worcester Track Prospects.

The candidates for the track team at Worcester Academy have now been training for over two weeks and the prospects for a winning team are very bright. The men will soon begin work on the out-door board track and a team will be sent to the indoor Interscholastic meet at Boston on March 18.

Worcester will probably be strongest in the field events this year, especially in the pole vault, and the weight events. The loss of Spear in the shot and hammer will be felt, but there are several promising candidates for these events; the best of whom is probably Norris. Both of the pole-vaulters of the '98 team, Scheuber and Gardner are still at Worcester and both have had considerable experience in competition. Captain Duffy will again run the 100 yard dash this year, at which event he is considered one of the fastest men in New England, and will also enter the hurdles.

The following editorial appeared in the last issue of the *Exonian*:

"The recent action of the Andover faculty gives the quietus to the hopes felt by many members of our literary societies that there might be an Andover-Exeter debate this year. We cannot believe that the schools will not eventually meet in debate, even if the reasons are good for not holding a debate this year. We trust that this will soon become an annual contest, for the results cannot fail to be largely beneficial to the literary life of both schools."

Rev. Dr. Scofield of Northfield in the interesting meetings recently held at the South Church, told the following anecdote:

"One of my very brightest students recently came to me and asked me to show him how to be a Christian. Supposing it was something I had said in a recent sermon, which had set the young man to thinking, and hoping that I might use the same thought in helping other young men, I asked the student which one of my sermons had impressed him. He replied that until recently he had paid very little attention to my sermons, and that neither Mr. Moody nor myself had really won a hold upon him.

"No," he said, "until a little while ago I had avoided Christians and Christian subjects but my room-mate has changed the whole atmosphere and made my life desires entirely different.

"My chum," he went on to say, "is not a bright scholar, in fact he is rather stupid and I have to help him every day with his lessons, but he has character and I never understood until recently what made him a person of such truth and worth. He has never been able to say much but his consistent Christian life has spoken volumes to me and now I want to get hold of the secret which makes his life what it is."

Exeter Letter.

EXETER, N. H. Jan. 23, 1899.

Editors of the *Phillipian*:

Considerable disappointment was felt here because of the decision of the Andover Faculty concerning the joint debate. Nevertheless it seems to be the unanimous opinion here that the time is not far distant when the sentiment in both schools will demand the inauguration of an annual contest.

The G. L. Soule-Golden Branch debate will take place early in the spring term. Both Societies have taken in a large number of new men and the interest in debating has been greatly increased. The Golden Branch will choose their representatives at a trial debate to be held Saturday evening, Feb. 4, 1899.

At a recent meeting of the Senior Class, it was decided to wear caps and gowns during the latter part of the Spring Term.

Preparations are now being made for the Winter Exhibition which is to take place in the gymnasium about the last of March. The "Gym" team is the best one Exeter has had for some time, the work of the tumblers and bar men being especially worthy of approbation. The Ninety-nine Drill squad has won the Stevenson cup twice and will make another trial for it this year.

An Interesting Coincidence.

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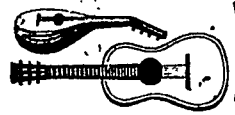
