ADDRESS AT INQUIRY.

Mr. Robert E. Spear to Speak To-morrow Evening.

Mr. Robert E. Spear, one of the most eloquent speakers in this country, a man very prominent in the work of the National Y. M. C. A., and in the religious movement in the schools and colleges, is to be at Andover to-morrow and will deliver an address before Inquiry in the evening.

Mr. Spear is a graduate of this Academy. While in school he was prominent in nearly every line, and later made an enviable reputation for himself at college. Since his graduation he has devoted a great part of his time to the work of the college branch of the Y. M. C. A., and to-day especially at Yale, but also at all the other colleges, he is by far the most popular of all the speakers. He is too in great demand all over the country. Mr. Spear is a young man but already has the reputation of being one of the finest talkers, one of the finest men in the East.

For a long time the Society of Inquiry has been doing its best to get Mr. Spear to come to Andover and speak before the society. Mr. Spear is at last to be here, and on Sunday evening a rare treat will be given which no one in school can afford to miss. The meeting will be held as usual in Society Hall, but will begin at 6.15. Mr. Spear will meet the fellows informally after the regular service.

To the Phillipian:

In a recent issue of the PHILLIPIAN there appeared an editorial on the article printed in the last *Mirror*, entitled "An Open Letter." It seems very evident to us, that the writer of this editorial knew very little of the circumstances of the case, or to bring it to a very small compass, of the absence of "the two of questionable membership."

We would say in defence of these two, that had the President abided by the right, by the Constitution, by the opinion and desire of the majority of the club (in this case the indisputably right majority) there would have been no such "childish squabble" as the PHILLIPIAN was pleased to term it.

It is only natural that anyone having worked as hard as those two members certainly did, should wish at least some little recognition of their services. As the school may, since so much has been said concerning this affair, consider that these two are in the wrong, it might be as well to add that the report that they acted their parts on a "minimum of rehearsal" was an absolute falsehood.

One was absent from three rehearsals and the other from two, his third being, as agreed by all, with the exception of the President, excusable, since another member, absent from the same rehearsal, and for the same reason was excused by the President it must be only too clear to the school as a whole, that the right thing was not done.

As for the constitution, it is a well known fact to members of the club at least, that there was none, and none has yet been procured. Only two of the members have ever seen the Constitution, and therefore memory was their only base of argument. For this reason a committee has been appointed to draw up a new constitution, and we trust it will be a better one than the former mythical one.

In closing we would like to say that instead of there being no club and no play this Spring, the club is still in existence with an excellent man at its head, that preparations are now being made for a play to be given in June, for which a trial is

shortly to be held, and that there is every promise of a most successful year.
