Though Andover defeated the Newtowne Athletic team last Saturday they did not play an exceptionally strong game. At the bat Andover appeared almost helpless and were only able to make a few hits. The home team won more on the misplays of the visitors than on their own merits, since many of the runs were made on gross errors by the visitors. To be sure the game was a great improvement over last Wednesday's game still there is a deplorable weakness at the bat as could be seen when time and again with men on bases the necessary men were struck out to retire the side nearly every time. For the visitors Clarkson played an excellent game. He pitched steadily throughout and showed suburb speed and control.

Mathews was first at the bat for Andover but was unable to hit the ball. Lanigan hit an easy grounder and was promptly thrown out at first. Davis took a base on errors, stole second and scored on two pass balls. Saunders hit to Clarkson and was retired at first. The visitors went out on flies to the outfield. In the second inning the first two men struck out and Barnwell made the third out on a long fly to left field. The visitors were unable to reach first in their half. Clarkson again struck out two of Andover's men and made a two bagger himself scoring in the last half of the third on a single by Saul.

In the fourth Davis scored again on errors while Newtowne scored on a hit and two errors. Andover did well in the sixth when with one on bases and two outs Davis, Saunders and Littlefield all made singles which netted three runs. The visitors were unable to score in their half while in the sixth Andover failed to reach first. Newtowne had better luck however and made fewer hits which were the means of their scoring three times and breaking even with Andover. The home team took the game in the seventh when Matthews and Lanigan scored. The visitors went out uneventfully in the seventh and both teams did the same in the eighth inning. In the ninth Lanigan walked to first but was put out on second by Clarkson's pretty fielding of Davis' hot grounder. Littlefield ended the batting for Andover and the visitors went to the bat for the last chance. The first two men went out on high

flies which Farnum handled in pretty style Matthews retiring the side by throwing Murphy out at first.

Will of Old Alumnus.

The will of ex Gov. Frederick Smyth who graduated from P. A. with the class of '54, was probated today. It contains private bequests amounting to \$46,500, and public bequests aggregating \$31,000, the balance of the large property left by the deceased being willed to his wife.

The public bequests include \$5000 each to Smyth library, New Hampshire home missionary society, Dartmouth college and Manchester city mission, \$2000 each to New Hampshire orphans, home at Franklin, Franklin st. Congregational society of this city, Manchester children's home, New Hampshire agricultural college at Durham and New Hampshire industrial school. The New Hampshire Bible society receives \$1000.

count of the Inter-class track meet.

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
