Philo.

The program for Philo for next Friday evening is as follows: Critique, Morse; Address, L. P. Reed; Declamation, Paine; Select Reading, Cullin. The debate resolved: "That boycott is an illegitimate weapon of Labor." Affirmative, Whitney and Phelps; negative, Smith and Baumgarten.

The regular meeting of Philo was opened last night with a prayer by G. E. Merrill.

After the roll-call and reading of the minutes of the previous meeting, Chittenden delivered an address. Following a declamation by Paine, came the debate. Resolved, "That a college education does not unfit a man for business life." Sweet, Gould and Demming supported the affirmative and Merrill, Gallyon and Simmons, the negative. The speakers from the house were Bacon, Arnold, Ballard, Matthews and Crippen.

The vote of the house stood, before the debate, affirmative 17, negative 7; after the debate, affirmative 5, negative 11. The chair decided the question in favor of the affirmative.

During the course of the meeting a resolution was received from Forum, congratulating Philo on the attainment of its seventy-fifth year.

After a critique by Clarke the meeting was adjourned.

Forum.

Forum held a very interesting meeting last night. Barsamian opened with a prayer, Morse following with a declamation. After a select reading by Ryder, McEwan gave a speech and Kellogg the topics of the week. Mann followed with an extempore after which the debate followed: "Resolved, That the imperial policy of Pres. McKinley should be upheld." The affirmative was supported by Barsamian and Crawford, the negative by Reed and Bishop. The vote before the debate was affirmative 16, negative 5; after debate affirmative 5, negative 11. From the house Morse, Kellogg, Colby and McEwan spoke on the affirmative; Mourad and Clerk on the negative. After the names of Nichols and Winslow had been proposed and accepted for membership, Baker closed the meeting with a critique. The election of officers will be held next term.

Yale Harvard Hockey Game.

The much looked forward to hockey game between Yale and Harvard was won, last Monday night, at the St. Nicholas Rink, by Old Eli by the close score of 5-4. The match was an extremely exciting one from start to finish and the playing of both teams was exceedingly good.

Baseball at Harvard, Yale and Princeton.

Of the men who played on last year's Harvard baseball team, W. T. Reid, Jr., '01, catcher; S. V. Morse '01L., pitcher; R. Fincke, '01, shortstop; G. C. Clark, Jr., '01, third base; E. F. Loughlin '00, center field, are again eligible for the team. With E. H. Kendall, '02, substitute first baseman last year, a strong infield should be developed, especially as Loughlin can play an infield position if necessary. New outfielders and pitchers will have to be developed.

At Yale all the outfielders have graduated, but a strong nucleus remains in the infield and last year's battery is also back. The members of last year's team still in college are Captain S. B. Camp, '00 shortstop; C. E. Sullivan, '00, catcher; F. C. Robinson, '01, pitcher; C. P. Cook, '01S., pitcher; L. D. Waddell, '01S., first base; and F. E. Quinby, '02S., third base.

Princeton has her veteran battery of the last two years still in college, and a strong nucleus of infielders. The University baseball players still in college are Captain F. W. Kafer '00, catcher; A. R. T. Hillebrand '00, pitcher; A. E. Meier '02, first base; R. F. Hutchinson '02, shortstop; D. V. Hutchings '01, third base; and W. H. Watkins '00, centre field. E. S. Burke '00, who played second base on the '98 team, will also be a candidate this spring.

Class Meeting.

At a meeting of P. A. and P. S. 1900, held Monday, it was decided that the class should not have caps and gowns for the graduation exercises.

Paris Exposition Guides.

A number of young American college men have been chosen by the authorities of the Paris Exposition to act as guides, interpreters and guards, at the Exposition grounds. Most of the men have already sailed for Paris in order to acquaint themselves with their duties. Among the colleges represented are Harvard, Cornell, Oberlin, Chicago and Michigan.

Harvard.

On account of the large expense incurred at Harvard by joining one of the boat clubs and by attending the various athletic contests, the Harvard Athletic Association decided upon the following method of reducing the expenses. Anyone possessing a ticket issued by the Athletic Association, the price of which is \$5.00, is entitled to the following: 1. Membership in either the Weld or Newall boat club. 2. Admission to all foot-ball games at Cambridge, including those with Yale and Pennsylvania. 3. Admission to all base-ball games in Cambridge, including those with Yale Princeton and Pennsylvania. 4. Admission to all track games in Cambridge, including that with Yale. 5. Preference in the choice of seats on the observation train for the Harvard-Yale race at New London.

Inquiry Next Term.

Beginning with next term the regular Wednesday evening Inquiry meetings will take the place of the bible class which has been held on Wednesday evenings during this term. The bible class, so far, has been a success and a great help to the fellows who attended it. It will be regretted that the class will not continue through the rest of the school year.

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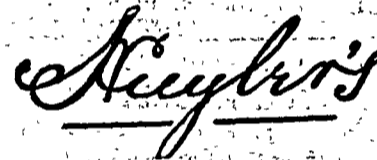
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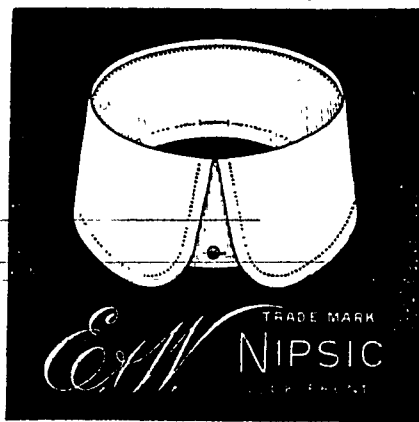
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
