Andover, 4; Harvard 2, 9.

Andover met defeat at the hands of Harvard 2nd last Wednesday in a slow and rather uninteresting game. The home team showed a weakness at the bat while Harvard hit consistently and when most needed. Three of the strongest infield players were kept from the game, so that two men played out of their regular positions and one was taken from the 1902 class team. Brown was in the box for the first time this season and pitched a very creditable game. Parker, captain of the 1902 team did well at third. He was inclined to be a little nervous, as it was his first game with the team, but on the whole his fielding was accurate and his throws to first excellent. Coburn, P. A. '98, pitched fast ball for the visitors, striking out eight men. He had good curves but was somewhat erratic and gave six bases on balls.

In the first inning Harvard gained an easy lead of five runs. Christian led off with a bunt to Brown which he beat out. Jane also bunted and reached first when Christian was thrown out at second. Day advanced Jane to second with a safe hit and Stewart walked. With the bases full Keene singled, scoring Jane and Day. Putnam struck out and Parton hit to Williams, who by a wild throw home allowed Keene to score and Parton to take third. Milne lined a grounder to Matthews which was too swift for him to handle and Parton scored. For Andover, Lanigan was thrown out at first by Coburn. Matthews singled but was put out at second in an attempt to steal. Stoddard and Winslow walked to first and Hasenwinkle retired the side with a hit to Keene. Neither side scored in the next two innings.

In the fourth Parton singled and Milne took first on a poor throw by Brown. Coburn went out on a bunt and Christian received a base on balls. A grounder to Lanigan brought home Parton. In the second half with one out Hasenwinkle got first on the baseman's error and second on a passed ball. On an error by Putnam he took third and scored when Parker went out at first.

Harvard 2nd failed to score in her half of the fifth although Keene made a hit and Putnam received a base. Williams flied out to Day; Brown and Lanigan walked to first. A second error by Jane gave Matthews second

and allowed Brown to score. Matthews brought in the last run for Andover on a hit by Stoddard. In the sixth Harvard increased her score by one run when Coburn got a base on balls, stole second and was brought in by Jane's single.

The seventh was played off rapidly and without score. Jane, in the eighth, hit to first and took second when Day was put out on an easy grounder to Parker. A hit by Stewart brought him home. In the ninth Putnam lined out a clean three bagger over Hasenwinkle's head and scored on Parton's single. In a slide to second Parton was put out on a beautiful throw from Winslow. Milne died at first and Coburn struck out.

Mott Haven Games.

This afternoon the annual intercollegiate athletic championships will be held at New York, being the 25th recurrence of the field and track meeting of the Intercollegiate Association of amateur athletics in America. For two years the University of Pennsylvania team has had a prescriptive claim to first place, ending a long alternation of honors between Harvard and Yale. The prestige of the Quakers make them the favorites in the forecast, but by no conclusive margin. There is a fighting chance for any one of the three big colleges and the points generally will be more widely distributed than ever before. Over 700 men have entered in the 14 events.

The engagement is announced of Archer T. Robinson, P. A. '92, Harvard '96, instructor in English in Tech., to Miss Mary Wistar of Salem, N. J.

The intercollegiate strength test record which was held by Cohens of Harvard was broken last Tuesday by Charles A. Carver of Yale 1900. The record he established is 2,073.3 kilograms, breaking the former record by 263.3 kilograms.

Polytechnic Institute at Troy.

The Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Troy, N. Y., is about to construct a laboratory for the test of electric motors and other electrical devices. It will also contain machines for the tests of materials of engineering. Sixteen electrical machines, including motors, generators, transformers, &c., will be installed in the electrical part of the laboratory. For the tests of construction there will be one 300,000 pound machine, one 100,000 pound machine, one 50,000 pound machine with extensions for long column tests, one 10,000 pound wire testing machine, and a cement testing laboratory thoroughly equipped in the most modern manner.

These will be of great value in the courses in engineering and science.

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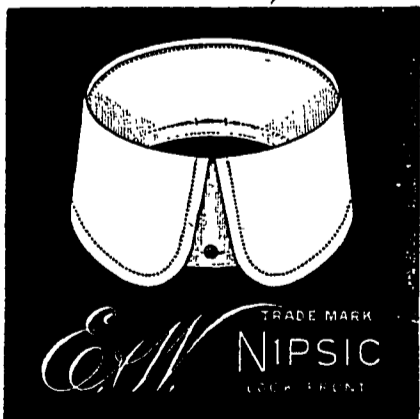
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New England Intercollegiate.
