## Philo.

Philo was opened last night by all the members rising together and saying the Lord's Prayer.

The secretary then read the minutes. Gallyon was appointed critique as the critique of the meeting was absent.

President Crippen gave a few words of welcome and then called upon Mr. Stearns for a speech.

Mr. Stearns spoke of Philo in his day, and among other things of the mock trial which was held in Chapel in 1888.
