## EXETER WINS BASEBALL

Defeats Andover 5 to 3 by Securing Four Runs in the First Inning.

In consequence of a lucky home run, with three men on bases, two out and two strikes called on the batter, Andover was defeated by Exeter last Saturday 5 to 3, in the annual baseball game between the two schools. The game was an illustration of the common characteristic of Exeter-Andover games, in that the supposedly weaker team won. A comparatively small crowd was present owing to the bad weather, and the cheering did not seem to be quite up to the standard.

As far as the game itself was concerned, the team which won did so by clean, fast, baseball, although it cannot be denied that the element of luck played a prominent part in the result. As it turned out the game was settled in the first inning by the home run by Merrow which brought in four men. The most aggravating thing about the situation, from the Andover standpoint, was not the hit itself, but the fact that the ball rolled so far into the foul ground as to get lost in the long grass, where it was not found until all the runners had crossed the plate.

The hit, at best, ought not to have been good for more than two bases. After this inning, both teams settled down to hard baseball, Andover making a strong uphill fight, while Exeter worked hard to keep down the score of her opponents and barely succeeded in increasing her own score by one run. The batting was comparatively light on both sides, though Andover had a little the best of it. In fielding there was not much to choose between the two teams, both putting up a first class game. Although Baker was much more effective than Cook, he was not so steady at the critical periods of the game. It was this steadiness of Cook's which prevented Andover from making runs at the needed time.

One of the noticeable features of the game was the quick relay work done by Hodge in getting the ball in to third from the right field. The catching of a high fly near the ropes by Scribner was one of the noticeable plays of the game. The work of both catchers and Exeter's center fielder was worthy of mention. Beach, especially, played an excellent game and was at all times cool and steady. Clough handled some low difficult balls well, and the work of O'Brien, although limited, was quite up to its usual standard.

On the whole, considering the conditions under which it was played, the game was fast and snappy, and close enough to excite the keen interest of all the spectators. And, undoubtedly, it was one of the cleanest Andover-Exeter games played in a long time.

### IN DETAIL.

O'Brien, the first man up for Andover, fouled out to Peters, Scribner fanned and Huskamp got out on first. For Exeter, McGraw knocked a two bagger into left field and was followed at bat by Peters, who sacrificed, thus

advancing McGraw to third. Cooney walked and stole second. Jackson flied out to Campbell, but Spencer got his base on balls. Merrow knocked a home run beyond right field, on which four runs were scored. Leigh retired the side with a grounder to Clough.

In the next two innings neither side scored. In the third, however,

Cooney knocked what looked like a two bagger, but he was caught on third.

O'Brien opened the fourth inning with a two bagger over third base, Scribner followed with one into right field, on which O'Brien scored. Huskamp knocked a base hit to Spencer, who fumbled the ball, allowing Scribner to score. Through two errors and fielder's choice Merrow scored for Exeter in the second half.

Clough, the first man up in the fifth, singled. Beach flied out to McGraw and Baker made a safe hit. Hodge knocked a two bagger, on which Clough came home. O'Brien flied out to Spencer and Scribner was thrown out at first, retiring the side for Exeter, Cooney died at first, Spencer was retired on a grounder to Clough and Merrow flied out. In the sixth both sides failed to score.

In the seventh Clough was thrown out at first and Beach flied out to center. Baker retired the side by striking out. In the second half McGraw was put out on a grounder to Baker, Peters flied out to Scribner and Cooney went out on a foul fly to Clough.

Hodge, in the eighth inning, fouled out to Peters, O'Brien flied out to Heim and Scribner died on a grounder to Cook. For Exeter, Jackson went out on a ground ball to O'Brien. Spencer got his base on balls but Merrow fouled out to Beach and Heim followed with a foul fly to Scribner.

Andover failed to score in the ninth and Exeter did not bat. The final score stood Exeter 5, Andover 3.

## ANDOVER WINS

In the New England Interscholastic Track Meet. Both McGovern and Kinney Break Records.

Andover closed a most successful track season last Saturday by winning the N. E. Interscholastic meet held on Soldier's Field, Cambridge. As was predicted the meet proved to be practically a triangular one between Andover, Exeter and Worcester academies. Andover was handicapped by the loss of Arnold in the bicycle race and Smith in the mile, both of whom were unable to compete on account of illness.

The attendance was the poorest in years and the weather conditions was decidedly unfavorable. In spite of these drawbacks the events for the most part, were well contested. Good individual work was done by Kinney, Sumner and McGovern of Andover, Doyle of Worcester and Wilson of Watertown High.

The 100 yard dash was won in fast time by Doyle of Worcester. Sumner and Watkins secured and third respectively. The 120 yard hurdles were also run in very good time. Scullin failed to qualify and Fry did not run. The mile run was won by O'Connell of Dedham High with Ferry second. Ferry ran a fine race.

In the 440 yard run Watkins was unfortunate soon after the start, in being compelled to hurdle two men who fell directly in front of him. By this mischance he lost fifteen yards. He made up most of this distance, however, and was beaten by only a few feet by Doyle, in slow time. In the 220 yard hurdles only one heat was necessary. Fry ran a good race being barely beaten by Anderson of Exeter in good time. Sumner won the 220 yard dash easily in fast time. He secured second in his trial heat which was won by Higgins of Exeter. In the final heat however, he let out and beat Higgins by a good margin.

The half mile brought out a large field of starters. Wilson of Watertown won in very good time. Edwards made his effort a little too soon and wore himself out. He defeated Allen of Exeter and secured third place. Both Marshall and McGovern failed to qualify in the high jump. Kinney won both the shot put and hammer throw easily. He broke the Interscholastic record in the hammer throw, held previously by J. Connor of Exeter, with a throw of 140 feet, 4 inches. Chase failed to qualify. McGovern and McLanahan did fine work in the pole vault. McGovern defeated Phillips of Worcester with a vault of 11 feet, thereby establishing a new record for that event. The one mile bicycle race was won by Brown of Exeter, with McDougall second and Knowlton of Exeter third.

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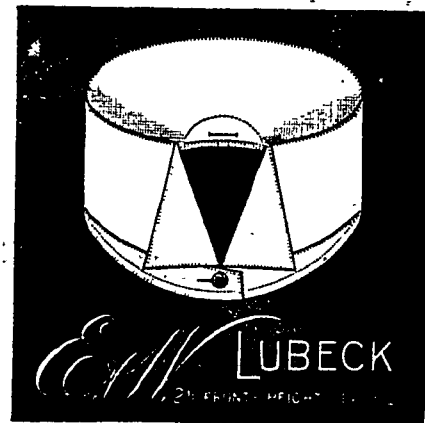
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
