ANDOVER WINS

Defeats All-Collegiate Team in a Slow Game by a Score of 6 to 0.

Andover defeated a picked team of college players from Boston and vicinity last Saturday afternoon in a rather uninteresting and slowly played game, the score being 6 to 0. The opposing nine was so weak that there was no opportunity to test the strength of the home team, and the efforts of the visitors furnished more amusement than anything else. Supple, who pitched for the visitors was the only redeeming feature of their team, but he received no support whatever. Andover played a careless game, especially at the bat, and there was no excuse for not running up a larger score. In general R. W. Brown pitched a good game and R. C. Brown showed up well as a catcher.

With one or two exceptions the batting was extremely poor and the backing up in the field was below the average; the base running was better than usual. The best feature of the game was Clough's bunt in the fifth inning with Huiskamp on first base.

IN DETAIL.

Dillon was first up for Andover and went out at first. Huiskamp followed suit and Clough flied out to Fitzpatrick. The visitors went out in order.

In the second inning Hall got his base on balls, stole second and scored on a passed ball. Hodge was thrown out at first. R. C. Brown got a life on Supple's error, stole second, and scored on a passed ball. Cox flied out to Connolly. Cushman reached first on Sullivan's error, took third when Connolly dropped R. W. Brown's fly, but was left as Dillon struck out. Brown struck out the opposing batsmen in order.

Huiskamp opened the third with a single but later was out at second. Clough reached first on an error but was left as Hall and Hodge struck out. The visitors failed to reach first.

Andover failed to score in the fourth. For the opposing team Devlin was given his base and advanced to second on Kelley's sacrifice. Howard and Sullivan flied out.

Dillon started the fifth by going out at first. Huiskamp singled, took second on Clough's fine bunt and scored on a passed ball, Clough reaching third. Hall received a gift and stole second. Hodge then singled to right field, scoring Clough and Hall, but was thrown out trying to reach second after the ball had been fielded in. R. C. Brown struck out. The visitors went out in order.

Veeder was then substituted for R. C. Brown. Both teams went out in order in the sixth inning and Howard, of the All-Collegiates, was the only man on either team who reached first in the seventh.

In the next inning Hall struck out. Hodge got a life and took second on an error, but was left as Veeder and Cox were retired at first. For the visitors, Kevens started off with a two-bagger to left field and took third

when Dodge struck out. Connolly was out at first and Kevens was caught at the plate trying to score on the play.

Cushman was first up in the ninth, but struck out. R. W. Brown singled, took second on an error and third on a wild pitch, and scored on Huiskamp's hit. This ended Andover's scoring. In the last part of the ninth, Supple struck out and Waddell reached first on an error. Kelley struck out and Howard was thrown out at first, Dillon to Clough.

HARVARD '06 WINS

Andover Defeated in a Miserably Played Game, by a Score of 10 to 3.

The Harvard Freshman base ball team defeated Andover last Monday afternoon 10 to 3 in an extremely poorly played game. The team made the weakest showing it has made thus far this season, Brown's pitching being about the only redeeming feature, although Huiskamp, Clough, and Schildmiller did well most of the time. R. C. Brown caught a very plucky game considering his bad finger, but the new men in general showed a lack of knowledge of the fine points of the game. Dillon was especially at fault in this respect, using no judgment whatever at times. The team was very weak at the bat and poor judgment was shown in coaching the men on bases. The team seems to give up too easily, and it needs to play with more confidence, ginger and life.

Grant and Taylor played well for Harvard.

IN DETAIL

Andover went to bat first and Dillon, Huiskamp and Clough went out in order. For Harvard, Bradburn and Grant got to first on errors and Leonard got a base on balls, filling the corners. Newhall struck out. Nichols then hit to centre for two bases, scoring Bradburn, Grant and Leonard, but was left as Spencer was out at first and Quigley struck out.

In the second inning Cox walked and stole second. Hodge got first on fielder's choice and Cox advanced to third. R. C. Brown lined out a two bagger to left field and Cox scored. Hodge, Hall and Hayes went out in order. The visitors failed to score.

R. W. Brown opened the third with a single but the next three men were easily disposed of. Harvard added a run to the score on Newhall's life, a sacrifice and a single.

In the fourth inning Clough singled and took second on an error, but could not score as Cox and Hodge struck out and Grant made a beautiful catch of R. C. Brown's fly in short left. Grant was the only visitor to reach first.

In the next inning Hall was thrown out at first and Hayes and R. W. Brown struck out. For Harvard, Newhall was safe on R. C. Brown's error. Nichols bunted and got first on an error. Spencer singled, putting Newhall on third. Quigley struck out and Taylor flied out; Newhall was caught at the plate trying to score on the throw in.

Neither team scored in the sixth inning.

In the seventh inning Schildmiller took Hall's place in left field and Baker was substituted for Hayes. Andover failed to score. Leonard started the inning for Harvard with a single and took second on a passed ball. Newhall drove a hot one at R. W. Brown who made a fine stop and got his man. In stopping this drive Brown injured his hand and had to

change positions with Baker. Nicholas was given his base and scored on Spencer's scratch hit. Quigley got a life and Leonard walked forcing in Taylor. Newhall singled, scoring Greenough. Nicholas ended the inning by flying out to Cox.

Andover failed to score in the eighth inning, and the visitors went out in one, two, three order.

In the last inning Cox died at first. Hodge was given his base and R. C. Brown received a similar gift. Schildmiller struck out. Baker walked, filling the corners. R. W. Brown got first on Bradburn's error and Hodge scored. Dillon was then given his base, forcing in R. C. Brown, but further scoring was prevented as Huiskamp was thrown out at first. Final score—Andover 3; Harvard '06, 10.

New Library.

In a few days the library cards to be used in drawing books from the new library at the Archaeological building will be ready.

The system for drawing books will be as follows:

To each student wishing to draw books a draw-card will be issued by the librarian. This card will be filed at the monitor's desk at the door of the main reading room. When wishing to draw a book the borrower will present the card at the monitor's desk. The monitor will then take from the file the borrower's card, and stamp upon it the number of the book and date. He will also stamp the student's number, and the date from the card, upon the book slip which will be found in the cover of the book. He will then take out the book slip and file it under the student's name and put the borrower's card in the pocket of the book.

In order that all may have the opportunity to read the books it will be necessary to limit each book drawn to one week, unless by special permission from the librarian, such permission to be given only where the demand for the book will warrant it. Upon returning a book the borrower must present the same at the monitor's desk. The monitor will stamp the return date upon the card and upon the book slip, and will then file the card and replace the slip in the book.

Postage stamps and postal cards will be for sale at the monitor's desk for the accommodation of those using the writing desks.

It is hoped that the library will meet the needs of every fellow and the librarian will be glad to consider any reasonable suggestions.

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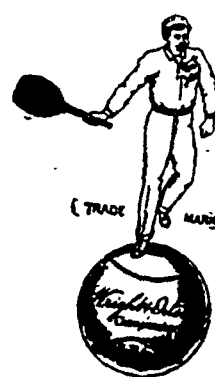
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
