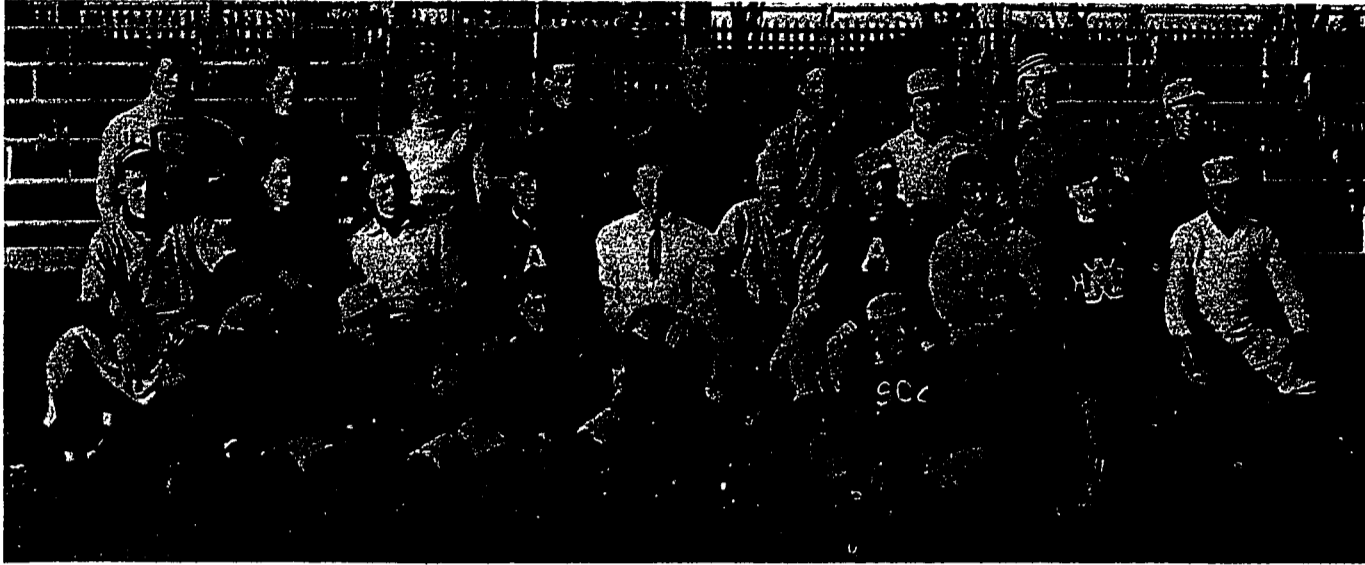

CHARLES CLAYTON CLOUGH ✓

1905, of Laconia, New Hampshire, is captain of the team and by his hard, earnest efforts has produced one of the best nines Andover has ever had. He has played first base on the team for the last three years and this year has steadied the whole team by his good work there. Clough is 19 years old, weighs 175 pounds, is 6 feet, 1 inch in height and will enter Princeton.

RODNEY WHEELER BROWN

1906 of Reading, Mass., is pitcher. This is Brown's third year at Andover and by his efficient work he has shown himself to be an excellent pitcher. He is 19 years old, weighs 160 pounds and is 6 feet, 1-2 inch tall. He intends to enter Yale.

ROBERT C. BROWN

1905, of Medford, Mass., is catcher and fills his position well. This is his second year on the team and he has also played on the football team two years. Brown is 20 years old, weighs 170 pounds and is 5 feet, 11 inches tall. He has not decided as to his college.

GILMORE KINNEY, JR.

1904, of Hoboken, N. J., plays third base. He is a good batter and covers his position well. Kinney is 17 years old, weighs 150 pounds and is 5 feet 8 inches tall. He will go to Yale this fall.

GEORGE HENRY SCHILDMILLER

1905, of Waterbury, Conn., plays left field. He has played this position for two years and end on the football team. He is 21 years old, 5 feet, 11 inches tall, and weighs 168 pounds. Yale is his college.

EDWARD A. DILLON

1905, of Lawrence, Mass., plays right field. He is 19 years old, 5 feet, 9 inches tall, and weighs 135 pounds. Dillon held this position last year and he plays quarter back on the football team. He will enter Harvard.

1906, of Palmer, Mass., is sub-fielder. He played on the football team last fall. Hobbs is 17 years old, weighs 178 pounds and is 5 feet 10 1-2 inches tall. He will go to Yale.

CHARLES L. LANIGAN

1905, of Lawrence, Mass., is sub-pitcher on the team. He is 17 years old, 5 feet, 8 inches tall and weighs 130 pounds. Harvard is his college.

DOWNING P. BROWN

1904, is 17 years old, 5 feet 10 inches tall and weighs 175 pounds. He

comes here from the Hotchkiss school and is going to Williams. Brown plays first base, is 17 years old, weighs 175 pounds and is 5 feet, 10 inches tall.

JOHN DREW BENNETT

1906, of Washington, D. C., plays in the field. He is 20 years old, 6 feet tall and weighs 165 pounds. He comes to Andover from the Pennsylvania Military college, and will enter Yale.

ALWIN TRUMAN CUMMINGS

1905, of Duluth, Minn., is a sub-pitcher. He is 19 years old, 5 feet 9 1-2 inches tall, and weighs 160 pounds. Cummings played on the football team last fall. He has not decided what college he will attend.

LESTER W. PERRIN

1904, of New Haven, Conn. is a catcher. He comes to Andover from the Hopkins Grammar school of New Haven. He is 18 years old, 5 feet 8 inches tall and weighs 150 pounds. Yale is his college.

LEMUEL HALL

1905, of Fall River, Mass., is 20 years old, 5 feet 9 1-2 inches tall and weighs 162 pounds. He has been pitching very well this season. He has not decided as to his college.

Archaeology Notes.

Professor Morse from Salem, delivered a very interesting lecture on Ethnology, yesterday morning, to Mr. Moorehead's Archaeology class, his subject being "A Comparison of the Japanese and Chinese Nations." He brought out and illustrated many interesting facts about the Japanese and Chinese languages.

An interesting historical object was recently received from Florida: It consists of an old rusty Spanish sword so old that the handle is decayed. It was found on the site of an old camp supposed to date back to the time of Ponce de Leon. Could the student reconstruct the history of this old relic, perhaps it was carried by a knight clad in armor and used with effect upon the savages of the land of flowers. Frequently ocean storms wash out Spanish arms, armor, hulks of old ships and other relics of Spain's vanished power in the South Land.

Several colleges are incorporating journalistic courses in their curriculum. The University of Michigan started the movement.

EXETER WINS

Andover Defeated on Brothers' Field This Afternoon in a Close Contest.

The afternoon of the game is perfect for baseball. Exeter comes on the field at half past two and is followed by Andover a few minutes later. Both teams engage in a short practice. The spirit shown by the two schools is fine and the good plays of both teams are generously applauded.

Andover takes the field at 3.10.

FIRST INNING

Tilton is first man up for Exeter and is out on three strikes. Flock strikes out and Heim flies out to Clough.

Schildmiller goes to base on four balls. Clough bunts and takes first, Schildmiller is forced out at second. Clough attempts to steal second but is thrown out. Kinney strikes out.

SECOND INNING

In the second inning Jones flies out to Reilly. Hamill and Cook both strike out. Reilly goes out on an easy grounder to first. Clapp makes a beautiful catch of R. G. Brown's hit to left. Dillon strikes out.

Score—Andover 0, Exeter 0.

THIRD INNING

Anson flies out to Cushman. Reilly throws Kemble out at first. Clapp strikes out.

Murphy is hit by a pitched ball and goes to first. R. W. Brown flies out to Clapp. Murphy is caught out on an attempt to steal second. Cushman strikes out.

Score—Andover 0, Exeter 0.

FOURTH INNING

Tilton strikes out and Flock singles to center. Heim puts another single to center, advancing Flock to second. Jones is hit by a pitched ball and goes to first, filling the bases. Hamill flies out to Murphy and Murphy throws home. R. C. Brown throws to third and catches Flock, who had attempted to go home.

Schildmiller is thrown out at first. Clough is out at first. Kemble throws Kinney out at first.

FIFTH INNING

In the fifth inning Cook gets base on a scratch hit to pitcher. Clapp runs for Cook. Anson sacrifices, advancing Clapp to second. Tilton takes Clapp's place on second. Kemble and Clapp both strike out. Reilly goes for Andover with a

clean single to left. R. C. Brown strikes out. Dillon gets first on Hamill's error and Reilly goes to second. Murphy is out at first but Reilly and Dillon go to third and second respectively on the play. R. W. Brown flies out to Hamill.

SIXTH INNING

Clapp makes a scratch hit to short. Tilton gets a base on balls and Clapp goes to second. Flock gets a scratch hit to pitcher and takes first, filling the bases. Heim hits to Cushman, who throws home, forcing Clapp out. Jones singles to left and scores Tilton and Flock. Hamill flies out to Clough, and Cook strikes out.

Cushman is hit by a pitched ball and goes to first. Schildmiller strikes out. On a wild pitch Cushman goes to second. Clough flies out to Tilton. Kinney is out at first.

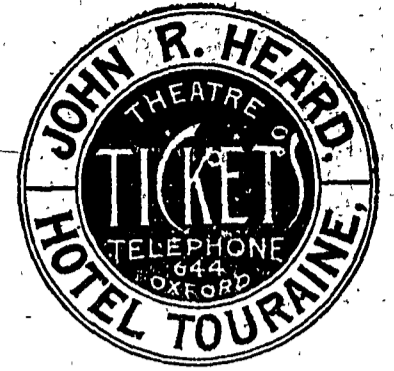

H. J. FLOCK

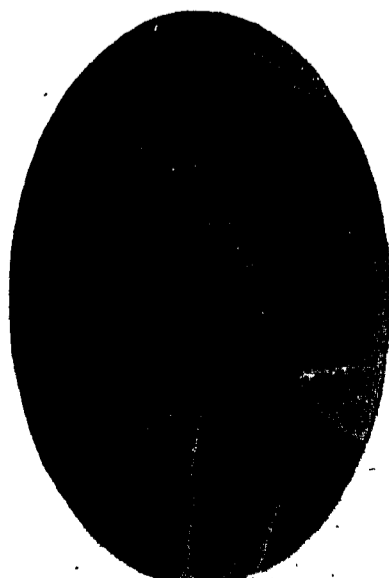
