The New Dining Plan.

After having conducted the Dining hall for two years on the American plan the trustees have decided to adopt the new scheme which is meeting with such great success at Harvard, Dartmouth and Yale. This is a combination of the American and European plans which produces two important advantages. The first and most evident is the increase in variety made possible in the regular board, and the second is the fact that each student pays for what he orders and practically that alone.

The general running expenses such as service, coal, light, heat, etc., which go on for all alike, are, and ought to be shared alike by all. This is accomplished by a fixed charge of \$3.00 per week for each student which pays his share of the running expenses and furnishes him everything except meat, fish, eggs and desert, these being ordered as desired and furnished at actual cost.

The plans for taking care of the extras or European part of the scheme have been the subject of careful consideration. The use of a meal ticket good for \$5.00 worth of eatables has at length been decided upon.

Each student will make his order out plainly on a blank furnished by the waiter who in turn will bring blank and student's meal ticket to the checker, where the ticket will be punched for the amount called for on the order and the waiter will then proceed to the serving room where his order will be filled. Rapid checking is essential and depends greatly upon the clearness of the orders.

Combinations are to be made a special feature and will run in price from 5 cents to \$1.60, the latter being a whole filet of beef with potatoes in any form and sufficient for six people. Soups will be served at 2 cents per plate and eggs will average about 2 1-2 each. In the line of deserts, puddings will be 2 and 3 cents, pie 5 cents and ice cream 10 cents.

The statement made above regarding the meats etc. being furnished at actual cost requires a little explanation. For example—chicken is one of the most expensive luxuries on the bill. It is bought "green weight" and the shrinkage when cleaned and cooked is very great. Now all of this waste and shrinkage in cooking must be equalized by the price per order of cooked chicken, and hence the high price. Rib beef is another meat having a heavy shrinkage and 11 cents scarcely pays for a good sized slice. But no matter what the article may be the amount of the bills for each per month must be equalled by the amount received for it in cash as shown by the orders.

The student employees are to be placed on a salaried basis—receiving so much per hour and paying their board as anyone else, and every effort will be made to make the service prompt, courteous and neat.

It is hoped that the new plan will prove satisfactory to both the students and the Hall itself.

International Meet.

The International meet between Oxford-Cambridge and Yale-Harvard will be held at the Queen's Club, London, on July 20. The Yale and Harvard teams will leave New York on July 6 on the "Tentonic" and will arrive at Liverpool on July 13. They will stay at the Hotel Metropole, Brighton, until the day of the game.

There will be only nine events held and only first places will be counted.

Yale has started her training table with the following men:

Broad jump—Sheffield, Yale; the other American entry undecided; Leech, Oxford.

Hammer throw—Shevlin, Yale; Glass, Yale; Littleton, Cambridge.

Shot put (if held)—Glass, Yale; Le Moyne, Harvard.

Coach Murphy and Manager Parks will accompany Yale's team.
