## HARVARD WON.

Defeated Andover Last Wednesday in Close Game.

Andover lost a hard fought and exciting basketball game to Harvard last Wednesday in the Hemenway Gymnasium, Cambridge, by the score of 27 to 20. The game was close throughout and the score was tied several times, neither team gaining any considerable advantage over the other until the last of the second half, when, with the score a tie, 20 to 20, Harvard braced and won out with but few points to spare.

The floor was much narrower than that of our own gymnasium and this fact handicapped Andover considerably in passing and dribbling. Also the baskets were not fastened firmly and this spoiled many good shots for goals. Neither team showed up well in team work the first half, though Andover easily excelled in this respect, but in the second half both teams picked up in this department and played one of the best games ever seen on the floor of the gymnasium.

Both teams had good individual players. Captain Murphy of Andover played the best game of the evening, breaking up Harvard's formations and passes many times, and shooting several difficult baskets. Gunning, also, played a fine game, playing around his opponent, Amberg, in every department of the game. He played the best game he has this season and was back in his old form again, for Amberg has easily excelled every other center he has played against this year.

Fels played a fast game at forward and prevented his opponent, Brooks, from scoring a point. Blumenauer showed the best form he has this season, though many of his shots for baskets in the first half were spoiled by the shaky fastening of the basket. Hennessey played a great game at guard and, though he did not have a chance for a basket, guarded his man well and was very effective in stopping long passes and dribbling by the opposing team. Goldsmith and Whiting, who took the places of Blumenauer and Hennessey respectively, did not have many chances to score but showed up well in defensive work.

For Harvard, Captain Griffiths played the best game, scoring 13 out of 27 points. Brooks and Amberg played well.

## GYM NOTES.

Open Nights to be Held Again. Other Events Also.

A very attractive program of Athletic class meets, and championship meets, covering a wide range of events, has been arranged by Doctor Page and the track management, for all this month. First, tonight, at seven o'clock, an open night will be held in the gym. This is an attempt to make the open nights more successful than in the past. A new event will also be instituted, the running long dive. The other events are 1-2 mile, fence vault, an exhibition of Jiu Jitsu, trick rings, and afterwards a stag dance. On Wednesday, March 21, the athletic class meet combined with the championship meet, will occur. There will be both outdoor and indoor events. Ribbons will be given to the men taking first, second and third places, respectively, and a banner will be given to the winning class team. Individual cups will be given to the three best all-around athletes making the most points in the championship games. The outdoor events are: 50 yard dash, 50 yard hurdles, 220 yard dash, 1-4 mile, 1-2 mile, 1 mile, class relay races. The indoor events: running high jump, running broad jump, pole vault, 12 lb. shot put. Besides these three meets, there will be on Saturday evening, March 31, a championship meet in fencing, boxing and gymnastics. This is an unusual program and should bring out a large number of fellows, both as spectators and participants.

**Harvard Admission Exams.**

The committee on admission has announced the following changes in the rules governing the admission of students to Harvard college and the Lawrence Scientific school:

"Hereafter, candidates who, at any time before their preparation is complete, wish to take examinations in subjects in which they are ready for examination may, with the approval of their school, offer themselves either in June or in September for examination in any subject or subjects in which they present a certificate of preparation. Consequently the old rules, (1) that candidates may not divide their examinations except between two years, and (2) that candidates failing in June may not be examined in September in the same subjects, are abolished."

"Hereafter, preliminary candidates who have received certificates of preparation from their schools will be credited with any subject or subjects in which they pass. The old rule, which fixed a

### Article on Basketball by Church Y. '04.

This is the second of our series of articles. It is written by Mr. Church, Y. '04, captain of the Yale Basketball Team in 1904 and also a member of the baseball team of that year, who takes "Basketball" as his subject. Walter Camp has previously written about football, and we have other articles on baseball, track, lacrosse, general sports, etc. Following is the article written by Mr. Church:

"Basketball, although one of the latest additions to the collegiate and scholastic athlete calendar, now holds as firm a position as any of its rivals, excepting of course, our two grand American outdoor games—football and baseball. And there are strong reasons why this should be so. The time of year of the basketball season, is the chief of the reasons. It is an universally admitted fact that strenuous exercise is an absolute necessity in keeping the average man in good spirits and condition for his more serious work, and in our northern climate where outdoor sports are, for a part of the winter, often impossible a good indoor game offering the keen physical competition of football and the same demands for quickness and decision as baseball is a boon indeed.

Besides this all important reason there is the peculiar charm of the game for one who has ever played it, and then the fact that it is now recognised by trainers as a sport that will keep a man in good condition through the winter and leave him fit for spring work on the track and field.

Perhaps one of the most fortunate moves in the late history of the game was the recent formation of a Collegiate Rules Committee and the drafting of a set of rules more adapted to the needs of school and college than those of the game as formerly played. The leaders in this work were the Intercollegiate Basketball Association, comprising Yale, Harvard,

The rules are now in sensible and complete form and with their proper enforcement the future of the game is assured."
