### TRACK VICTORY

Andover Wins Harvard Interscholastic Meet with 50 2-3 Points. Volkmann is Second with 21 1-3

Andover won the twenty-sixth annual Harvard interscholastic track meet, held last Saturday afternoon in the Stadium at Cambridge. The team of twenty two men scored 50 2-3 points, with five firsts, two ties for first, three seconds, three thirds, and four fourths. Volkmann School of Boston won second place with 21 1-3 points; Exeter, third, with 16 1-3 points; and Worcester Academy, fourth, with 14 1-6 points. Nine other schools secured scattered points in various events, Boston Latin, Newton High, and Stone School, among them, winning places in 'the order named. This is the second year that Andover has won the meet successively, and so will have possession of the cup, given by Harvard un-·dergraduates, for another year. The following men won their first track "A" by securing one of the first three places in an event: Clough, Cooke, and Gardner.

Andover was able to enter more weight men in the Harvard meet than in the Yale meet on May 4th, and so proved exceptionally strong in the field events, scoring here 26 of the total points, and winning all places in the hammer throw, a fourth in the shot put, first and second in the broad jump, and two ties for first in the pole vault.

- Hart of Exeter broke the Harvard interscholastic shot put record with a put of 43 feet, 3 1-2 inches. Captain Kilpatrick of Andover was again the individual star of the meet, capturing four / firsts and one fourth, a total of 21

points, equal to the total number of points won by Volkmann School, which won second place in the meet. Kilpatrick secured first place in both hurdle races, broad jump, hammer throw, and fourth in the shot put.

The team, left Andover at 11.48, reaching the Stadium at one-thirty. The men taken on the trip were: Captain Kilpatrick, Hopkins, Rosendale, Patton, Lewis, Brainard, Clough, Dowling, Greenough, Gardner, Knox, Dain, Cooke, McCreadie, Morrison, Continued on Page 6.

# BASEBALL DEFEAT

Villanova Team Wins From Andover Yesterday on Brothers Field. Score, 4 to 1

Andover narrowly escaped a shut-out vesterday afternoon at the hands of Villanova, the final score being 4 to 1. Until the ninth, the playing of the home team\_was good. but in that inning three scores were added to the visitors' tally. Andover, however, frequently changed her battery men. Belford started the game with Pfau behind the bat. He held the opposing batsmen to but one hit in the entire six innings that he pitched. In the sixth, Burdett went in in place of Pfau and in the seventh, Thompson succeeded Belford. McKay took Thompson's place in the eighth. Villanova's line-up remained unchanged throughout the game.

The game in detail ----

Andover took the field promptly at 4.15. McEhrlan, heading Villanova's batting, list, was given his base on balls and stole second. Lavage struck out and on Daniel's grounder to Belford, McEhrlan took third, but was left there as Nichols flied out to Badger.


In the last half of the first, with one out, Merritt was given a base on balls, and took second on Badger's hit to left, which the fielder misjudged. Reilly reached first on the fumble of his grounder by the third baseman. With men on first and second McIntyre hit to short, who threw to second, forcing Reilly, the second baseman, getting the ball to first in time to retire McIntyre also, making a pretty double play.

Villanova scored her first run in the second. Murray reached first on Shannon's error and was advanced to third by Moore; who hit to short. Then with one out, Casey hit to Shannon, who touched first instead of throwing home, Murray scoring. Barr struck out, retiring the side. Score: Andover o, Villanova I.



120 YARD HURDLES.

Two preliminary heats were run, the first two men in each heat qualifying for the final. Kilpatrick of Andover, Young of Worcester, Chadwick of Exeter, and Kelley of Worcester, qualified. Final heat won by Kilpatrick (A); Young (W.), second; Chadwick (E.), third; Kelly (W.), fourth. Time, 16 4-5 seconds.

### 100 YARD DASH

Four preliminary heats we rerun, the first two men in each qualifying for final. First heat won by Rosendale (A.); Peake (E.), second. Second heat won by Nelson (V.); Burns, (B. L.), second. Third heat won by (B.); Eames, (P. P.), second. Fourth heat won by Tower (E.) and Selegman (B.), second. Final heat won by Nelson (V.); Burns (B.), second; Seligman (B.), third; Towe (E.), fourth. Time, 10 seconds.

### ONE MILE RUN

Dowling and McCreadie were the Academy team's entries in this event.

Lee of Stone School, won the race; Dowling (A.) was second; Gourlie (A.), third, and McCreadie (A.), fourth. Dowling lost his chances of winning when he fell down in the second lap, being spiked by another runner. Time, 4°minutes, 51 3-5 seconds.

### 880 YARD RUN

Hubbard, Sheldon, and Morrison were Andover's entries in the half mile. Jacques of Volkmann won; Rodgers (E.) was second; McKay (P. T.), third; Jones (W.), fourth. Time, 2 minutes, 5 3-5 seconds.

220 YARD HURDLES

Two preliminary heats were run, in which Kilpatrick easily qualified, among Young (W.), Chadwick (E.), and Kelly (W.). Kilpatrick won the final heat by a splendid spurt. He fell just over the tape, receiving bruises upon his shoulder. Kelly (W.) was second, Young (W.), third, and Chadwick (E.), fourth. Time, 26 2-5 seconds.

### 220 YARD DASH

Cooke, Hopkins and Rosendale entered from Andover, qualified for the finals. The final heat was won by Nelson (V), Burns (B), second; Cooke (A), third; and Hopkins (A), fourth. Time, 22 1-5 seconds.

### .440 YARD RUN

Knox, of Andover, won the quarter in good form; Foster (V), second; Sprague (E), third; and Shay (D), fourth. It was one of the best races of the afternoon, and the time, 55 3-5 seconds, was good, considering the condition of the track.

### BROAD JUMP

Andover secured both first and second places in this event, Kilpatrick winning with a jump of 21 ft., 3 in.; Rosendale was second with a jump of 20 ft., 3 1-2 in.; Long (E), third, 19 ft., 2 1-2 in.; Chandler (B), fourth, 19 ft.

#### IG-LB. SHOT PUT

Andover secured third and fourth places in this event, Clough and Kilpatrick, respectively, being the point winners. Hart, of Exeter, won with a put of 42 ft., II I-4 Bartlett (W), second, 39 ft.; in.; Clough (A) third, 38 ft., 10 1-2 in.. Kilpatrick (A), fourth, 37 ft., 8 1-2 in. Hart, of Exeter, broke the Harvard interscholastic record, after the competition was over, by a throw of 43 ft., 3 1-2 in.

### HIGH JUMP

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
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
