## MOST SUCCESSFUL SEASON

**Andover Has Completed one of the Most Successful Basketball Seasons in the History of the Academy.**

With the victory over Lowell Textile last Saturday night, Andover closed one of the most successful basket ball seasons in the history of the school. In spite of a hard schedule of twelve games, including the strong Harvard Freshmen, Dean Academy and several other big teams, Andover succeeded in winning every contest of the season. The team was fortunate in having three veteran players and a lot of good material at the beginning of the season. Snell, Swihart, and Litchfield were all members of the team last year, and all played very strong, steady games through the year's schedule.

The season opened on Jan. 13 in a game with Rindge Manual Training School, resulting in an easy victory for the home team, score, 28 to 19.

Next in order was a fast and hard game with the strong Boston Interscholastic team, on Jan. 16. The contest was one of the closest and most interesting of the season, Andover finally winning out in a brilliant spurt by the score of 28 to 23.

Andover won an easy victory over St. Anslem on Jan. 20. The visiting team was rather weak, and Andover walked away with the game from the start, winning with a score of 44 points to 8.

On Jan. 23, Andover defeated the Lowell Textile team with as much ease as she had St. Anslem the previous Wednesday. The team showed exceptionally good team work in this game, and won easily by the one-sided score of 50 to 5.

On Jan. 30, Andover added another victory to her list by defeating the Worcester Polytechnic team by the score of 26 to 17.

One of the fastest games in the season was played against the Brown second on Feb. 3. In this game the home team met with experienced players; and Andover did extremely well to win as she did after five minutes extra period by a score of 20 to 18.

In the first out-of-town game, Andover defeated the Harvard Second on Feb. 6. The deciding basket was thrown by Swihart in the last minute of play.

On Feb. 10, Andover administered defeat to the Cushing Academy team. The game was fast and rough, the home team making 23 points to Cushing's 10.

## LOWELL TEXTILE DEFEATED

**Andover Makes a Record of Twelve Straight Victories by Defeating Lowell Textile at Lowell**

Andover brought the most successful basketball season during recent years to a close last Saturday evening when she defeated Lowell Textile School by the score of 46 to 20. The game was held in the Textile School's building at Lowell, and many girls from Roger's Hall came down to witness the contest. Andover took fourteen men over to Lowell, the list being as follows: Snell, Swihart, Litchfield, Johnston, E. Reilly, Hay, Coates, Sherman, Avery, Raymond, J. A. Reilly, Dougherty, Mr. Swift and Dr. Page.

The game was characterized by frequent fouls, no less than thirty being called in the course of the game. Two Andover men, Snell and Swihart, were removed from the game by the five foul regulation, while Bunce and Brainard had to be removed from Lowell's lineup. Andover defeated Lowell at Andover a short time ago by the score of 50 to 5, but on their own floor Lowell played a much stronger game. The game was played in a cage, and consequently no outside rules were observed.

The team found it rather difficult at first to accustom itself to the cage, but they soon found themselves, and took a good lead which they held to the end. Bunce played a conspicuously good game for Lowell, making fourteen of her twenty points. Reilly and Johnston excelled for Andover.

The game in detail:

FIRST HALF

The game started at eight o'clock with Brainard and Johnston the opposing centers. Play commenced with a rush, and Bunce immediately scored a field goal for Lowell. Reilly evened matters up, and Snell put Andover in the lead, with two successive baskets. Andover fouled, and Bunce tallied for Lowell, but Snell scored a moment later in the same manner. Swihart scored a pretty basket, and was followed by Reilly a moment later. At this point a double foul was called, Snell and Bunce scoring for their respective sides. Bunce scored two more points on fouls, and followed it up with a beautiful basket from the center of the floor. Snell scored twice on fouls, after which Reilly made a goal from the field.

Lowell now got together, and Bunce tallied twice, once with Snell on top of him, and again from the

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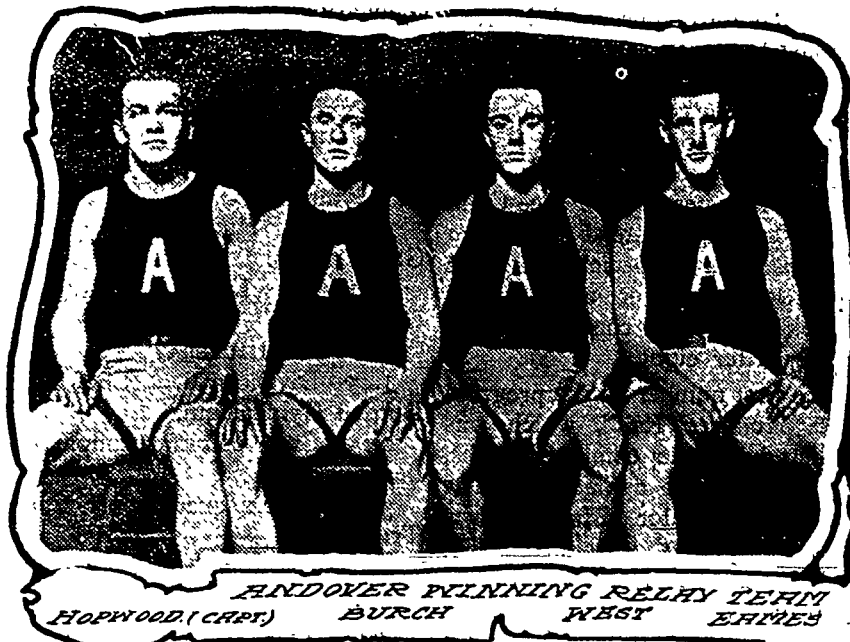
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**ANDOVER WINS RELAY RACE**

Andover was unable to do better than sixth place in the actual number of points won, but this was partly due to the

fact that she held back some of her best men in order to save them for the team race with Exeter. Exeter easily won the meet with 24½ points, her closest rival being Worcester Academy with 18 points. By this victory, Exeter won the big silver cup, offered by the B. A. A., as a permanent possession.

Early in the meet Worcester got the encouraging lead of nine points, by winning all three places in the shot put, but Exeter piled up the points steadily after this, and the contest was finally decided when Fred Burns of Exeter won the 300-yd. run from Worcester.

The final 40-yd. dash was one of the prettiest races of the afternoon, the runners keeping neck in neck for over half the distance, when O'Hara of the English High pushed a little ahead, and went to the tape a little in the lead. Hadley, of Malden High, got second, while O'Connor got third for Worcester.

The real interest in the 600-yd. race centered in the contest for third place between Boyd of Exeter and McCulloch of Andover. McCulloch lost out after a very pretty race by a scant two feet.

J. P. Jones, of Exeter, took the 1000-yd. run in easy style, although his time was comparatively slow.

The mile run was a close race between Dowling of Andover and Lawless of Brown and Nicholas School. Dowling put up a hard race from start to finish, but was beaten to the tape by a slight margin. He led for the first lap at which point Callanan of Exeter

beautiful style, but lost out in the finals. Harris of Providence won the race by a foot, after a hard struggle with Clancy of Newton.

As was expected, Worcester captured all three places in the shot put, the best put being 45 ft. 8 1-4 in.

The high jump proved to be the most successful event of the afternoon, R. D. Chandler of Brookline breaking the record with a jump of 5 ft. 10 3-8 in.

The Andover-Exeter relay was easily the best team race of the afternoon, and the feature of the meet. This was the race for which Andover had been saving some of her best men, and she won easily by almost a half a lap, coming within 4-5 of a second of breaking the B. A. A. record. Andover won the pole and sent Hopwood to the mark, while E. Barlow started the race for Exeter. Both men got a good start, and for two laps it was an even race. Hopwood ran with a long even stride, while Barlow seemed to have a good deal of trouble at the corners. On the last lap Hopwood drew away from the Exeter man, and by a sprint at the finish he managed to turn the race over to Burch with six yards to spare. T. H. Guething, Exeter's second man, could not keep up with Burch, and the latter began to open up a gap which increased at every lap, until he reached West with a lead of 15 yards. Although winning the race was almost a hopeless task, Crandall of Exeter put up a pretty race, and for two laps the men stayed in about the same relative positions. The Exeter run-

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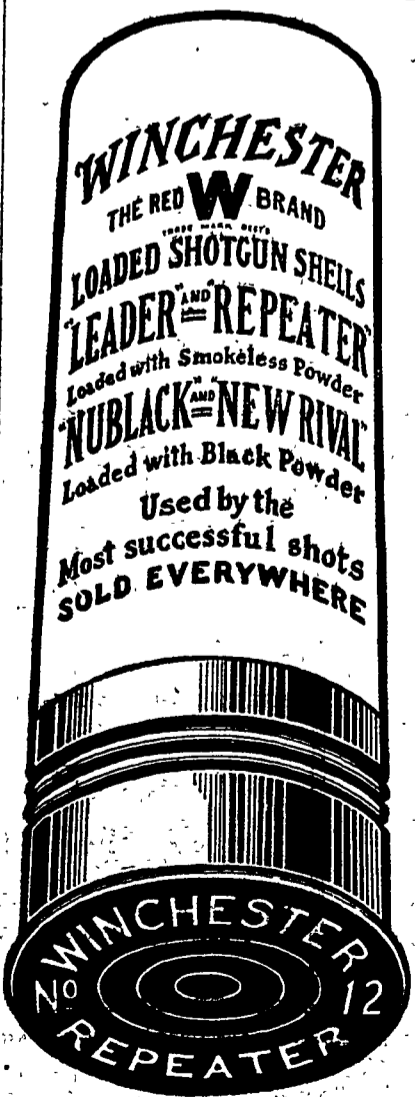

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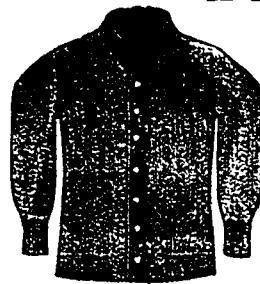
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
