Mr. William Harnden of Tewksbury, loaned the Deaprtment a large collection of specimens found about Andover, Tewksbury and Ballardvale. These are on exhibition in the first case to the left, south side of

The Indians of this part of New England were exceedingly primitive and the specimens in the collection are much ruder than those from the West and the South. The workmanship on the implements indicates that the natives made use of poor material, that they were unable to do fine work in stone. Many of the specimens have the appearance of great age. There are a few collections from the vicinity and therefore the exhibit is of special local value.

Provisional Election from Senior Class to Scholarship Society will be Made Soon.

Provisional election from the Senior class will soon be made to membership in Alpha Delta Tau, the honorary scholarship society of secondary schools. The Harvard Freshmen track team defeated the Yale Freshmen in the Stadium last Saturday by a narrow margin, the final score being 61 2-3 to 55 1-3. Yale showed the best form in the field events, capturing most of the places in them. Harvard took the track events without much difficulty. The weather was most disagreeable and the track very heavy.

Several good times were made, the best being that of Ranney of Harvard, who won the quarter-mile in 51 4-5 seconds, breaking the former record of 52 seconds, made by E. K. Merrihew in 1907.

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

The 100 yard dash yas run in two heats, Cornell and Burns of Exeter each winning their heat. In the final heat R. Gill of Mercersburg finished first in 10 1-5 seconds Burns of Exeter in that order. H. A. Paynter of the Central School; of Philadelphia came in fourth.

The 120 yards hurdle race was also a very interesting race. It was run in four heats. In the first heat Green of Mercersburg won in 17 seconds followed by Crandall of Exeter; Hall of Mercersburg won the second heat in 17 2-5 seconds with Davidson of Hill second. The third heat was run in 17 seconds by Ethridge of Lawrenceville with Potter of Hill second. The semi final heat was won in 17 1-5 seconds by Crandall of Exeter. Davidson of Hill taking second. The final heat was won in 16 4-5 seconds by E. H. Ethridge of Lawrenceville, Hall of Mercersburg securing second place, and Greene also of Mercersburg took third. Crandall of Exeter came in fourth.

The 440-yard run was won by Mercer of the George School in 51 seconds. He was followed closely by O'Connor of Worcester Academy, while Decker and Pillsbury took third and fourth places in that

The 880 yards run was interesting from the start. The men kept together throughout the first lap, and it was almost impossible to pick winners until the last lap was well under way. W. J. Bingham of Exeter finished first in 2 minutes, 1 1-5 seconds. Chaplin of Hill was a close second with Hayes followed closely by Cornell and of Andover immediately behind him as third. L. Kinney of Williston took fourth place.

> The 220 yards hurdle race was one of the prettiest races of the day and Eames of Andover won easily in 25 1-5 seconds, with Crandall of Exeter as second, Hall of Mercersburg third, and Ethridge of Lawrenceville as a close fourth. The race was run in four heats. Eames won his heat in 26 2-5 seconds. Hall Ethridge and Crandall each won their respective heats in time averaging between 28 and 26 sec-

> The 220 yards dash was run in two heats. R. Gill won the first heat in 23 seconds for Mercersburg. He was followed closely by Cornell and Brush who took second and third places respectively. The second heat was won by Luke of Lawrenceville in 22 2-5 seconds. Burns of Exeter came in second, with Dunn of Mercersburg third. The final heat was run in 22 4-5 seconds by Cornell of Exeter with Gill of Mercersburg second. Burns also of Exeter came in third and

Luke of Lawrenceville took fourth

The shot put was won for Worcester Academy by Roos with a put of 47 feet, 5 inches. Bartlett, also of Worcester took second place with a put of 46 feet, 2 inches. Waller of Lawrenceville secured third place making a put of 45 feet, 9 inches, and Simpson of Mercersburg was fourth with a distance of 44 feet

The high jump was very closely contested. Oler of Pawling School secured first place by a jump of 5 feet, 8 1-2 inches. Bartlett of Worcester Academy was a close second with a jump of 5 feet, 7 1-2 inches. Porter of Andover took third place with a jump of 5 feet, 6 3-4 inches. Brainard of Andover Baker of Hill and Rowbotham of Mercersburg tied for fourth place, each making a jump of 5 feet, 5 3-4 inches.

The pole vault was easily won for Mercersburg by Rowbotham with a vault of II feet. Linn of Hill and Mercer of George School tied for second place, each vaulting 10 feet, 9 inches.
