ANDOVER WINS

Academy Baseball Team Defeats Bates in Ten-inning Game by Score of 1 to 0

In a hard-fought, ten-inning game last Wednesday, Andover defeated the Bates College nine by the score of 1 to 0.

Up until the final inning only three men on both teams got as far as third base; then after Daugherty had gone out to right field, H. Middlebrook beat out a grounder to Griffin, Bates' captain, at first base. He then stole second, and scored the only run of the game on Boles' hit over the center fielder's head.

Although the weather was bitterly cold, this was the best game that has been seen on Brothers Field this season. Bates only made two hits off Andover's pitchers, Mayo making a two-bagger off Sawyer, and Reagan getting the other hit off Wardwell, while Andover made six safeties off Bosworth. The home team played an errorless game, but her opponents made two errors, although neither were costly. Boles and L. Middlebrook did the best work at the bat, the former making a two-bagger and a single, while the latter made two singles and secured a base on balls.

FIRST INNING

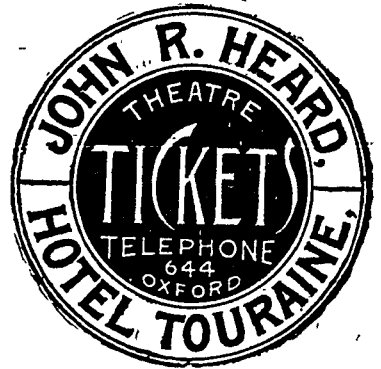

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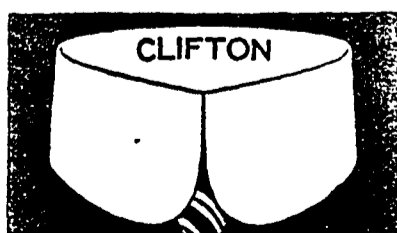

At the regular meeting of Philo last night, H. F. Smith chose a very interesting selection from Kipling for the select reading. Thomas gave the topics of the week.

The subject for the debate was, "Resolved, That a free trade in natural products between the United States and Canada would be beneficial to the United States." Chutter, with Lawrence as assistant, upheld the affirmative, while Cooke, with Hale as assistant, took the negative. The vote on the merits of the question were in favor of the negative, but the vote on the arguments gave the decision to the affirmative. Mr. Crawford was the critic.

Constitution of P. A. Orchestra

ARTICLE I NAME

The name of this organization shall be: The Phillips Academy Orchestra.

ARTICLE II. OFFICERS

There shall be two officers: a leader and a manager. At the discretion of the Orchestra, these two officers may be combined under one officer, a leader-manager.

ARTICLE III ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Officers for the following year shall be elected annually in June

by a majority vote of the Orchestra.

ARTICLE IV.

DUTIES OF THE MANAGER

The manager shall have entire charge of money matters. He shall, before the annual election, submit his accounts to the member of the faculty in charge of the Orchestra, to be audited, and then submit them to the Orchestra. He shall in consultation with the leader, arrange about the purchase of stickers, shingles, fobs, music, and printing. In consultation with the leader and the member of the faculty in charge of the Orchestra, he shall make arrangements for all concert engagements.

ARTICLE V

DUTIES OF THE LEADER

The leader shall preside over all rehearsals and meetings of the Orchestra, and shall have a notice read in chapel on each rehearsal day, designating the time and place of rehearsal. He shall, in consultation with the manager, arrange about the purchase of music, stickers, shingles, fobs, and printing. He shall consult with the manager and the member of the faculty in charge of the Orchestra about all concert engagements.

ARTICLE VI

Stickers shall be given to all members of the Orchestra before the annual election, and must be signed by the leader and manager. Watch-fobs shall be given if the

condition of the treasury warrants, to all who in the opinion of the leader and the manager, have faithfully attended rehearsals and concerts throughout the year. Other members may have fobs on payment of cost of same.

ARTICLE VII

REHEARSALS

Rehearsals shall be held once a week during the first two terms, and at other times as the leader sees fit.

ARTICLE VIII

From time to time as the treasury demands, the manager shall have the power to collect such sums from the members of the Orchestra as the members direct by vote.

ARTICLE IX ENGAGEMENTS

The Orchestra shall refuse to play at any function on less than twenty-four hours' notice.

ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS

This constitution may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the Orchestra.

ARTICLE XI

This constitution shall be left in charge of the member of the faculty has charge of the Orchestra.
