## YALE FRESHMEN WIN

### Andover Defeated 5 to 1 in First Game

Saturday afternoon Andover played the Yale Freshmen on Brothers Field, and were defeated 5 to 1. Considering that it was Andover's first game, played against a team which is in the middle of its schedule, we made a very good showing. The chief factors in causing our downfall were the pitching of Underwood, who only allowed us one hit, and the batting of Le Gore, who made three hits and three runs for Yale. The fielding of Easton, Exeter '13, the remarkable throwing arm of Le Gore, both of Yale, and the brilliant fielding of Murray and Snell of Andover, were the features of the defensive work of the two teams.

Two Andover men, Thompson and Conway, both '13, played on the Yale team while Sharpe, '13, was present in the capacity of substitute. These, and two old Exeter players, Milbourne and Easton, were cheered heartily before the game.

### FIRST INNING

Yale Fresh—Milburn was the first man up before the visitors, and was given his base on balls. He was safe at second on a sacrifice hit by Easton. Le Gore hit a two bagger, thus scoring Milburn. Bush struck out and was followed by Rhett who was thrown out at second, but Le Gore was safe at home.

Andover—Snell, the first man up for Andover, was out on a foul caught by Sullivan. Sheehan struck out, and Faherty made the third out, his fly being caught by Easton.

### SECOND INNING

Yale Fresh—Andover played good ball this inning. Thompson, the first man struck out, Sullivan who followed was thrown out at second by Sheehan, and Shafer was thrown out at first.

Andover—Andover scored her only run this inning. Newton, struck out, Grant walked, Murray was safe at first on an infield hit, but Grant was thrown out at second. Early was at the bat, Murray stole second and came home on Early's two bagger. Kinney then flied out.

### THIRD INNING

Yale Fresh—All three of Yale's men were thrown out at first this inning. They were, Underwood, followed by Milburn, and then Easton.

Andover—Butterfield was out on a throw to first. Snell's fly was caught by Le Gore, and Sheehan flied to Milburn.

### FOURTH INNING

Yale Fresh—Le Gore struck out. Bush was thrown out at first by Murray. Rhett, the third man, singled, and was safe at second on Murray's low throw. Thompson made the third out, being thrown out at first.

Andover—Faherty struck out, Newton flied to Bush. Grant walked and Murray's fly was caught by Milburn.

### FIFTH INNING

Yale Fresh—Sullivan was safe at first on pass ball. Shafer, singled and stole second, forcing Johnson who was thrown out at third. Underwood struck out and Wilburn was thrown out by Kinney.

Andover—Early flied out to Sullivan, as did Kinney who followed and Butterfield was thrown out at first by Underwood.

### SIXTH INNING

Yale Fresh—Easton flied out to Kinney. Le Gore singled and was followed by Bush who struck out. Le Gore stole second. Rhett at the bat. Le Gore stole third and was

## YALE CLUB MEETING A BIG SUCCESS

Dean Jones of Yale and Prof. Hincks Are Chief Speakers

Last Saturday evening, a meeting of the Yale Club was held in the Grill. As was announced, Dean Jones, Mr. Hincks, "Bev" Thompson, and Lindsay Bradford were the speakers. The meeting was entirely informal.

"Mac" Baldrige introduced the first speaker as "Bev" Thompson, who played quarter-back on the football team which defeated Exeter 7 to 0. Thompson began by saying that one who comes down from Andover to Yale has a speaking acquaintance with one out of every five in his class. This is a big advantage. Yale is just like Andover, only on a bigger scale. There has been some talk by critics that Yale is losing her spirit. This is not true. The spirit is right there. It was in evidence in the last Harvard-Yale football game during the last half. With Harvard ahead and Yale practically beaten, they fought right on, every move on pure nerve. At a recent crew meeting the coach outlined his plans, which were to see who were the best rowers in the college. If the captain is not good enough he will not row. This was put into effect, as Captain Denegre was removed to second boat last week, as he was slow in getting started. Thompson closed his speech by saying that a fellow coming down from Andover has got to make good and is going to make good.

Lindsay Bradford, an old Andover man, was the next speaker. He apologized that the Andover club at Yale had not paid more attention to the Yale club at Andover. But we must take into consideration that it is a long five hours' ride from New Haven to Andover, and besides a pretty strict account of cuts is kept at the Dean's office. There is a tradition that Yale does not buy its men. Many other colleges induce men to attend their Alma Maters, but it is not the Yale way. The Andover club realizes that it is formed from a closer relation between the school and college. There has been formed a Bureau of Information at which one may learn anything concerning Yale. Information will be furnished on the most trivial subjects on communicating to "Ben" Avery.

Mr. Hincks, who has lived in Andover for the past twenty-five years, was the next speaker and after him, the speaker of the evening, Dean Jones. By request these men have asked that their speeches be not printed, as they were meant for Yale men and the Yale club at Andover only. The

## INQUIRY

### Interesting Talk on Labrador is Given

Last Sunday evening at the regular meeting of the Society of Inquiry, Mr. Greene of Amherst gave a very interesting talk about Labrador, and the mission work carried on there by Dr. Grenfell.

Mr. Greene left New York two years ago with some Amherst men, to go to Labrador to study the work that is being done there; but unfortunately he found when he arrived there that it would be necessary for him to spend the summer on Horse Island, which is about seventeen miles off the coast.

Mr. Greene's first picture gave a general view of St. John's, with a hill in the background on which was located the only memorial on the whole island for John Sebastian Cabot. The building from which the picture was taken is one of the finest in the region, and belongs to Mr. Grenfell. In the basement of the building there are bowling alleys and pool rooms, and a special feature which consists of the only swimming tank in Labrador. On the main floor in the manager's office, soft drinks can be secured by sailors and others. Upstairs there are small rooms, each furnished with an iron bed, a chair, and a table. These rooms are let out for the night for twenty cents, which includes a cup of coffee and toast in the morning.

The city of St. John's is overrun with churches and religious activities. The streets are crowded with priests. On the day of Mr. Greene's arrival three important church conventions were being held.

Most of the boats in that locality burn wood instead of coal. The great disadvantage is that the wood takes up too much room. For this reason a scow is loaded up with it, and is then tied onto the back of the ship. Every morning enough wood is taken on board to supply the demands of the day. Even boats which are not run by engines, usually have a scow behind, in order that there be some wood for cooking purposes.

The boat on which Mr. Grenfell sailed from St. John's was called the "Strathcona," after the Englishman who gave it. On the deck of the boat various additions have been made, thus making her a little top-heavy; consequently she was a very bad sea-goer. Dories are hung to Davits off the sides of the ship, and in very rough weather, the water touches them. Once the Strathcona rolled so far that the waves knocked the bottom out of one of the boats.

As the mail steamers are not allowed to carry dynamite, they were obliged to take three hundred pounds on board the Strathcona. The purpose of the dynamite is to blow the stumps and rocks out of some of the big farms. This is the only method by which one can obtain a little fertile ground for cultivating crops.

After several days on the water they arrived at Mr. Greene's destination, Horse Island. The total number of inhabitants at that place numbers 149, and all belong to fourteen families. None of these people had ever seen a steamer or the like enter their port; so consequently great admiration and surprise was shown when the Strathcona approached the island.

The people are very ignorant, and are about one hundred years behind the times. Mail is only received once every three weeks, under favorable circumstances. If there is a fog the mail carrier would not dare to make the trip to the island; and every time he does, it is at the risk of his own life. After November there is no means of communi-

ation, for the sea is so covered with ice that it would be impossible to make the attempt to get to the mainland by boat.

There is one church on the island. On Sundays, six services are held, and it was the duty of Mr. Greene to attend them all. The people might be called "Howling Methodists." A peculiar characteristic is the way the people sing loud at the services. On cold, raw days, a fireman is appointed, and it is his duty to keep a fire going with the pieces of wood that the people bring with them to church.

The young children usually go to school, but are rarely well dressed. The young girls go to school until they are about twelve years old, while the boys stop school at eight, and go to work with their fathers. Until they are twenty they receive no pay and act as apprentices; after that they get credit for half of all the fish they catch.

The men work from two in the morning until nine at night, while the women work from four o'clock in the morning until nine at night. In the winter the men engage in seal-hunting, which secures them three and a half dollars a skin.

By the score of 65 2-3 to 41 1-3, the Exeter track team defeated the Harvard Freshmen last Saturday in their annual meet. The events were closely contested, Exeter showing up handsomely in the field events where Harvard was weak.

Westmore Willcox of the Freshmen equalled the world's inter-scholastic record of 48 4-5 seconds for the quarter mile, held by Meredith. Edward Teschner, also of Harvard, equalled his old Exeter record of 21 1-5 seconds in the 220. The quarter mile run which Willcox, a "dark horse," captured over Morrison Orr, the brilliant Exeter quarter miler, was without exception one of the greatest quarter mile races ever held in the east between two schoolboys. R. S. Cook, an old Andover man, won the mile for the Freshmen in 4 minutes, 44 2-5 seconds. J. Warren Feeney, who was here last year got third in the 880 yard run.


