## CLASS TRACK MEETS VERY SUCCESSFUL

Under perfect weather conditions, the first of a series of three interclass dual track meets was held yesterday afternoon. The class of 1916 won out over 1917 by 48½ to 31½ points, while the real outcome of the 1915-1918 meet is yet to be decided, owing to a mix-up in the quarter-mile.

The times and distances which were established exceeded the expectations of the school and unearthed a number of promising men. Meyer, '16, put the shot 39 feet, while Converse, '18, made a jump of 18 feet 9 inches, capturing the broad jump for the Juniors and making the best jump of the day.

1916 defeated 1917 by a score which was not anticipated, as the Junior Middlers fully expected a victory. The surprise of the day was the opposition given by the Junior men who are tied with the Seniors and the decision rests with the outcome of the quarter-mile to be run next Monday. The race was undecided, as Gerrigues, who was three yards in the lead on the home stretch, stumbled and

## TRACK MEET TO-DAY

Andover Seems to Be Favorite for Harvard Interscholastics

This afternoon the annual Harvard Interscholastics in track will be held at Cambridge. As Exeter has entered in these events, a direct comparison can be made of the teams, which is expected to be favorable to Andover. Last year our track team was victorious.

The preliminary trials for track will be held at 11 o'clock and the finals will commence at 3.30 in the afternoon. The team is now in fine condition, and all its members are eligible to compete except A. H. Russell, pole vault, and W. M. Russell, weights, who are debared by the age limit. Captain Prescott has recovered from his illness and will probably enter four events. Three of the records made in previous Harvard Interscholastic meets are held by Andover men.

Harvard Second Team an Easy Prey for Andover Nine

Andover continued her former winning streak by beating the Harvard Second team on Brothers Field last Wednesday afternoon.

Although the game lagged almost continually, our boys showed that they could be depended upon when the necessary punch would put runners across the plate. In only two innings with men on bases did the team fail to score at least two runs.

The errors of our opponents were rather costly and, unlike our team made nearly as many misplays, they were not made at nearly such critical moments. Except for the strong wind which blew in gusts across the field from time to time, the day was ideal for a ball game.

Through the game Ashley and Swan, made brilliant stops, which were heartily cheered by the spectators. The batting by nearly all the players was especially good.

In the first inning there was no scoring on either side.

In the second, Harvard went out in order. Andover scored three runs on a base on balls to Faherty, a sacrifice by Sheehan, a single by Ashley, Butterfield's out, McManus's single and two errors by Harvard to Robinson and Crane.

The third inning brought a run for Harvard. W. Swan grounded to Ashley, advancing Ames. The runner then stole second and scored on an error by Butterfield. In her half of the third Andover batted Fitzgibbons out of the box. We scored two on Wilson's single and an error by Ames, allowing Sheehan to reach first. ### Rifle Club

Those interested in the Rifle Club and, who wish to carry out this work still further this summer will do well to go to the summer military camps which are run by the government to train school and college men for officers in the National reserve.

About these camps we quote President Drinker of Lehigh University, who writes in the *Harvard Alumni Bulletin*.

"It would be a great error to look on these camps as training schools intended simply to develop a measure of military efficiency or to foster a spirit of militarism in our young men. Unquestionably, pursuant to the traditional policy of our country, they train and instruct a body of citizen soldiery who can be availed of as officers in case of war,—but they give the men attending a splendid and unique summer outing at a minimum of cost and a maximum of benefit and pleasure under the care of selected army officers and under the best conditions of camp sanitation and oversight. I speak not only from my general interest in the project as one of great educational and material value to our young men, but from the personal knowledge

I gained by my visits to the camps in the summers of 1913 and 1914."

The student is only put to the expense of paying his board at \$3.50 per week, and of purchasing his khaki uniform, costing altogether from \$500. to \$10.00, according to quality.

The regular army troops cooperate in the instruction, field manoeuvres, exercises, and demonstrations while officers give frequent lectures. The men rise early and have brief "setting-up" exercises. After a short rest which follows breakfast there are several hours of instruction and practice in various drills—infantry and cavalry drill, fencing, broadsword practice, artillery drill, etc., usually ending with a lecture on some topic of interest. The afternoons are given over to recreation or to further voluntary exercises, and the evenings to social engagements.

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### Suggestions from Coach Connor

George A. Connors, coach of the Exeter track team originated the following novel plan, which was published in the *Yale News*:

"My idea is to send a team of champion track men from the Eastern preparatory and high schools to the Panama-Pacific Exposition to compete against a representative Western and Middle-Western team.

"The Eastern team could be picked from among the winners of the various events in the most important interscholastic meets which include the Yale Harvard and Princeton interscholastic meets especially and also several others. The winners of the first two places in every important event would compete in an Eastern championship track meet held preferably in the Harvard Stadium since the intercollegiate will be held on Franklin Field at the University of Pennsylvania this year. Thus the winners in this meet would be well qualified to represent the East at the Exposition in San Francisco during the summer.

"There are several difficulties which must be overcome before my plan could go into effect. The chief obstacle is a financial one. A great deal of money would be necessary to transport thirty men comfortably across the continent and back, for there would be at least thirty. In addition, the expenses of a much larger number of men for the trip to and from the big trial meet would have to be met.

"As to ways of defraying these large expenditures, there are several. First, there occurs naturally the idea of using the gate receipts of the trial meet, which would be very large were the meet held in the Harvard Stadium for the interest in track in the Boston metropolitan district is strong. Then the track associations of the big Eastern universities could materially aid the project. Lastly, but perhaps most important, the Athletic Committee of the Exposition might be inclined to give financial aid.

"However, the financial difficulty overcome, the proposition if carried out would be a splendid thing for track athletics here in the East and merits the support of the preparatory and high schools and the colleges and universities of the Atlantic coast."

### Yale Undergraduate Calendar

The *Phillipian* has secured information from the Yale Calendar Board in regard to the fall competition for positions on the Board, in the hope that this information may be of benefit to prospective Yale men. We print the following extract:

The Calendar is run under the supervision of the Bureau of Appointments of the University, that is, the Self-help Bureau, and permission is obtained from this Bureau by the prospective competitor, before he can enter the competition. One man is taken on the Board each year from the Freshman class, becoming Manager in his Senior year. The competition begins within two or three days after the opening of college in the fall, advance notices as to minor details being placed in the *Yale News* at the time. Liberal commission is given on all work, even if the competitor does not win the competition, and to the successful competitor, there is the lucrative position on the Calendar Board, in addition to this commission. Anyone expecting to meet a part of his college expenses by work here can well afford to keep the Calendar in mind, and resolve to enter the Competition when he enters college in the fall. We shall be glad to give further information to anyone desiring it.

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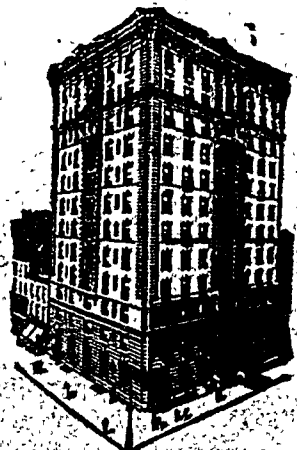

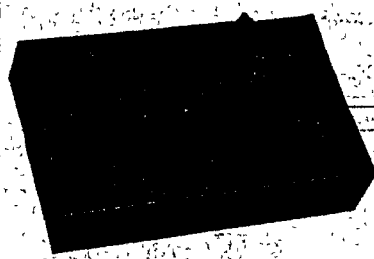

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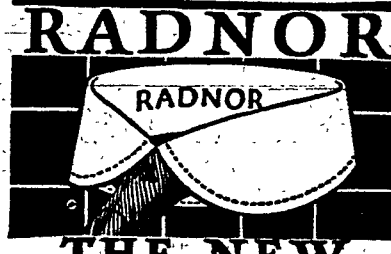
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
