## LAWRENCE WORK

Mr. Quimby, as Director Makes Report for Winter Term

To the Students of Phillips Academy: As your director in the Lawrence work, I beg to submit my report for the winter term of 1916:

The Lawrence work for the winter term started immediately after the opening of school, since which time, up to March 10, thirty-four sessions were held. There was a total attendance in the classes of 370 men, an average of slightly less than eleven. This is less than half the attendance of the first term. There is always a considerable falling off after Christmas as the work is necessarily slow, and the men easily get discouraged. It has been especially so this year, in view of the fact that the mills have been very busy, very many of the men have been working nights, and it has been impossible to keep up a steady attendance.

The work this term has been along the same lines as last, the classes being divided into three sections, namely, beginners, intermediates and advanced. The beginners covered simple forms of English, adding to their vocabulary, the use of the present, past and future tenses of the verb, the pronouns, together with spelling and writing. The intermediate classes have been increasing their vocabulary by reading English and American history stories, and have been studying the principal parts of the verb. The advanced classes have read some simple forms of poetry, historical stories, and a superficial study of English and American forms of government.

The following talks have been given by members of the Faculty on Sunday evenings: February 13, Mr. Hudson, a travelogue with pictures on London; February 20, Mr. Crawford, on George Washington; March 12, Mr. Moorehead on the American Indian. On Sunday, March 5, the Academy Mandolin Club gave some selections at a concert given by the Lithuanians to their friends, which was very much appreciated and enjoyed by them.

## SUMMER TRAINING CAMP

Plans Now Complete—To Last From July 5 to August 8

Application blanks for the Preparatory School Camp for military training to be held next summer will be in Dr. Page's office in a few days. All those who desire to attend should sign up as soon as possible, in order that they may receive the necessary instruction in rifle shooting. The details of the camp are as follows:

### QUALIFICATIONS

Applicants must be of sound physical condition capable of the severe physical work of drill, and manœuvres with full infantry equipment; eyesight normal or corrected by glasses.

They must be members of preparatory schools, and at least fifteen years of age.

### PERIOD OF CAMP

July 5 to August 8.

### LOCATION

The camp will be located on Fishers Island, Long Island Sound. It is reached via steamer from New London. A U. S. Man-of-War will be detailed to do transport duty to take the members of the camp to and from their sham battles and drills on Long Island.

### EQUIPMENT

Each man must have: 1 pair tan marching shoes (broken in), medium weight socks, 1 pair sneakers, underwear, 2 pairs olive drab breeches, cotton; 1 pair leggings, regular pattern; 2 olive drab shirts, wool; 1 blouse, cotton; 1 campaign hat and cord (special for preparatory school military training camp); toilet articles.

Articles of uniform may be purchased from Army & Navy Cooperative Co., 16 East 42nd Street, New York; 1123 S. Broad Street, Philadelphia; Sigmund Eisner, 103 Fifth Ave., New York; The Harding Uniform Co., 22 School Street, Boston; from the camp store, or any military outfitter.

The Munson last shoe is recommended, but any good leather tramping or hunting shoe will be permitted. Bathing suits are recommended.

Civilian clothes, etc. in trunks and suit cases will be properly stored.

### EXPENSES

A deposit of \$22.50 (to be made on reporting) for mess and \$5.00 to cover loss and damage to government property. If there is no loss or damage the \$5.00 will be returned at the expiration of the season. Railroad fare is extra, as is the equipment.

### INSTRUCTION

The instructors are officers of the regular army. Each company will have attached to it one or more sergeants.

The purpose of the camp will be to give each attendant as much of the fundamental education of an officer as can be imparted in the duration of the camp. A certain definite routine will be prescribed for all, including infantry training and rifle practice.

## BASEBALL PROSPECTS

In looking forward to the prospects for a successful baseball team at the school this coming spring, it can be said that they are fairly promising, provided ineligibility does not take away part of the material, as at the start there is by no means a wealth of material. From last year's team there are left in the outfield Captain Faherty, Gordon and Crane; Ashley, last year's short-stop, is still in school, as is also Brennan, last year's third baseman. There are also Wilson, one of the change pitchers, and Robinson, who was also on the squad. The positions to be filled therefore are behind the bat, first base and second base, provided the men from last year's team are able to hold the positions they filled last year, or are not made ineligible by studies. To fill the catching position, Tracey, Field and Braden at present look to have the best chance. They are all inexperienced but have possibilities. The following new men are trying for pitcher in addition to Wilson and Robinson: Bradley, Rubsamen, Cooley, Lind, Munger, Sherman, Gowans, Murphy and Stover. Sherman, Gowans, Murphy and Stover are left handed, and the rest are right handed, and it is expected that a reasonably strong pitching staff can be picked from these men. For first base Pfaffman, Horgan and Stone are trying, but it is likely that this position will depend on the hitting ability of the successful one. In the infield, Allen, Warren, Davis, O'Connell, Rock, Farrell should be able to fill the position at second base and give Ashley and Brennan a hustle for their old positions. D. B. Sawyer, Boyd and Drake are trying for positions in the outfield.

## RIFLE CLUB

Andover Team Leading in Tournament—Outdoor Work Soon.

In the Massachusetts Association of N. R. A. Clubs Spring Tournament which closes April 15, the Andover Rifle Team is leading in both prone and standing scores. At the close of this competition work will begin on the Frye Village outdoor range for the Andover men. Each shooter will be allowed to substitute one day a week of rifle practice for one day of athletics.

Beginning Monday the outdoor short range in back of Brothers Field will be opened for the use of reduced charges in the regular service rifle. At this time all men who have qualified on the indoor range by making two consecutive scores of sixty points or more will be given an opportunity to become familiar with the bolt-action rifle, using a light load in order to avoid the recoil. It is the purpose of the instructors to correct at this time all faults in the holding and management of the rifle which might be injurious if persisted in when using the full service load. All members who do not qualify for outdoor work will be expected to continue practice on the indoor range until they are able to do so.

As soon as a sufficient number of men have taken up the outdoor practice there will be an opportunity for those who intend to go to one of the summer military training camps to take up these vacancies. Information concerning this may be secured from the secretary of the Rifle Club or from Dr. Page.

There will be a final opportunity for members to order rifles, automatic pistols, ammunition, and sling straps during the following week. This is positively the last chance to do this and all orders must be in not later than Saturday, April 15.

## Schedule of Hours for Track Men

The first spring track practice took place last Wednesday afternoon under the direction of Coach Blanchard with about sixty-five candidates on hand. The outlook is at present rather discouraging for only thirteen men are eligible to compete, but many of these will get their conditions off this week.
